A Word from Dan

No Strangers

Where have I gone wrong? On Father's Day, I end up paying for the meal! You might think, "What is he grousing about? At least he gets to be with his kids." Well, yes, I get to be with two of the three; the third one lives in Africa. Most of us have a little distance in our relationships.

A little note here: Zambia, Canada, and the USA all celebrate Father's Day on June 17th, while Australian

readers have to wait until September.

Back to my convoy of thought. I do not mind buying lunch for the young adult kids. Like most of you, I am delighted to spend time with them. The special day has nothing to do with getting attention for myself but catching up on what is happening in their lives. Sure, I appreciate a hug and a "Thank you, Dad," but how can I encourage them as they travel this life road?

Some professional drivers do not have strong relational connections with their kids—or anyone else, if truth be told. I spoke with two different drivers on the same day and both of them confided that they felt disconnected. The first one told me that the only relative he has is a nephew and he uses the nephew's mailing address, but his route never lands him there. He is always on the go and is isolated from meaningful connections. The second driver described how he feels disconnected from God when he does something wrong. As a result of the shame he feels, he hides in the shadows from God.

The Apostle Paul wrote that we all were alienated from God by our own doing, but the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ made a way for us to be reconciled to God (Colossians 1:21-22). Being reconciled is having the "bad blood" worked through and the friendship reestablished. It is a connected relationship rather than an uncertain one. And *when*—not *if*—we walk off God's path, He is absolutely ready to forgive when we confess our sin (1 John 1:9).

Isolation is the default mode for too many in the logistics workforce. There are many obstacles to connection with God and with others. TFC is glad to be on a mission to help make connections possible. For TFC chaplains, there are no strangers—just friends they haven't met yet. Some drivers have dedicated routes and can meet with the same chaplains regularly, while other drivers and chaplains talk on the phone if they cannot get face-to-face.

From 12 to 284: The Ohio Truck Show History

That today is the TFC Ohio Truck Show & Benefit Auction began as the TFC Great Lakes Truck Rally. It was the vision of the local Wayne County TFC Chapter, with help from the North Coast (Cleveland area) Chapter, that birthed the first Rally in June of 1991.

The first Rally was held on a Saturday at the Wayne County Fairgrounds in Wooster, with twelve trucks arriving to kick off the late afternoon event. TFC supporters from all over the area attended, filling the tables with salads and desserts to complement the pulled pork, which was donated and roasted on site.


The following year launched the first truck parade, which would be the start of something people would look forward to every year. That year the attendance at the rally grew to 160 people, with sixteen trucks in the parade. The Truck Roadeo also became an annual event, offering drivers a chance to test their skills. It wasn't until around 1996 that the Benefit Auction would become an annual part of the Rally. From 1991 to 2000 we met at the Wayne County until the Fairgrounds administration decided the GoldWingers Motorcycle Club was a better deal for the venue. We had to find a new location, so in 2001 we moved the Rally to Central Christian High School in Kidron. We would be there from 2001 to 2008.

Space was becoming limited at Kidron and plans were made to move the Rally to the Holmes County Expo Center in Walnut Creek in 2009, but we met there only that one year. With two great supporting communities, Wayne and Holmes County, plans were made to expand the event to Friday evening and Saturday. From 2010 to the present, Friday evening begins in Kidron with food, music, and trucks beginning to assemble at 5:00 PM, leaving at 7:00 PM for the 22-mile "Parade of Lights" (convoy) stretching for seven miles through Mt. Hope, then through Berlin, and back to Mt. Hope for the feature music and more food until everybody is ready to call it a night. Saturday begins with a pancake/sausage breakfast, and for lunch it is BBQ chicken and burgers. There are kids activities throughout the day, and then the final touch—the Benefit Auction ending the day.

The Parade of Trucks has grown from sixteen trucks in 1992 to 284 in 2017! So come and join us in Kidron and Mt. Hope on July 6 and 7. Hope to see you there!

KW: Thanks, guys. You are the best.

Pete: Same time next week. Talk to you then.

hat are your memories of your dad when you were growing up? Some of us may have happy ones of doing fun things together or remembering how he taught us to ride a bike, drive, or bait a hook while fishing. Some have sad memories of a father who died too young, or lived too far away to visit, or was absent or even abusive. Others may have no memory of their father at all.

But did you know there is someone else who wants to be your father? Someone who can be to you everything you may not have had in your earthly father; or, if you were one of the blessed ones who had a great dad, this father can be more for you than even the most wonderful earthly father could be. I am talking about God, who wants to be your Heavenly Father.

The Bible tells us that none of us can know the Father on our own merits, as we have all sinned and have a broken relationship with God. Romans 3:23 states clearly, "for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." How, then, can we know the Heavenly Father? How can we enter into this relationship with Him?

Because God loves us so much, He made a way for us to be restored to Him. "This righteousness from God comes through faith in Jesus Christ to all who believe" (Romans 3:22). born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God" (John 1:12-13).



While they were there as tourists, still, their eyes and hearts were always caught by the sight of trucks and truckers. "Truck drivers have been embedded in my heart by the grace and mercy of God," Doris wrote in their recent newsletter, recalling God's leading her to marry a truck driver fifty-plus years ago.

hen our son Jere and his wife, Kristen, invited us to go with them on a trip to South Africa, we could hardly contain our excitement. In the following months we did a lot of planning and dreaming. Jere and Kristen's daughter, Jana, was in Muizenberg, South Africa (Cape Town area), for training with Youth With A Mission. The leadership of YWAM told Jere that the best time to visit her would be at the end of her ministry training and service. Thus, we left the United States on February 28.

Our trip was family-oriented, so we followed the schedule that Jere and Kristen laid out for their fam-





ily of seven, but I always kept my eyes on the lookout for truck stops and truckers—which were very scarce in the Muizenberg and Cape Town area. However, we began seeing more trucks after arriving in Hoedspruit, where we were hosted by a husband and wife who specialize in wildlife preservation. Truck stops were very small and without parking spaces for trucks. They were only for refueling, so most truckers parked along the road if they were not refueling and they wanted to go inside the building. These truck stops reminded me of quick stops in the USA. We found the truckers to be friendly and professional, especially the ones I photographed, one of them the driver for Coca-Cola.

A famous person once said, "Any old stick of a man will do for a dad." Some men may meet the criteria, but there is much more to it than just being physically present now and then, or here and there. Wives and children don't want men to be emotionally, intellectually, or spiritually absent. Grunting from behind a newspaper or giving marching orders from the couch doesn't cut it. "I'll Do It Just This One Time"

aul wrote the second chapter of Romans to Jewish readers who believed they enjoyed a special relationship with God because they knew and obeyed His law. Many believed this relationship placed them above the law, and so they were not careful in their lifestyles.

They excused behaviors that were wrong and trusted in their supposed privileged position to shield them from the consequences of their actions. But it's never enough just to know and approve of what is right. It is never enough to be a church member or to be born into a Christian family. Nothing has meaning without a relationship with God that is alive and based solely on faith in Christ as your personal Savior.

Paul is speaking to religious people who lack a living relationship with God. Religious people are prone to rationalization. They occasionally have a strong belief system. But when their beliefs and behaviors conflict, they may resolve the internal conflict by finding excuses for themselves. Many people are pro-life, but when it comes to an unwanted pregnancy in their own home, some are able to rationalize an abortion. Many oppose pornography, but allow themselves to indulge secretly. Nobody, I repeat, nobody is immune to rationalizing and excusing sinful behaviors and attitudes.

People rationalize sins such as cheating on their taxes, lying, having temper tantrums, gossiping, being bitter, harboring a grudge, controlling others, resisting change, continuing an addiction, or having an affair. "Everyone does it." "I deserve it." "It doesn't really hurt anyone." "I'll only do it this one time."

Consider the Last Supper, when Jesus told Peter that he would deny Christ. In response, Peter adamantly proclaimed his love and loyalty, claiming he would lay down his life for Jesus. But some hours later, Peter was able to rationalize the exact opposite of what he professed he would do. And, indeed, he denied Christ—not once, not twice, but three times.

Perhaps you have fallen into this rationalization trap. You know God's Word. You say you believe it. And yet, when

it comes right down to your personal circumstances, you find a way to rationalize behavior that the Holy Bible condemns. Hypocrisy? You bet! But don't just pout, shift blame, or deny you're in this category. Reflect and examine why you're tricked into thinking that your behavior results in your benefit rather than your harm.

Today, don't rationalize or hide. Stop posing. Jesus died so you could lead a transformed and abundant life. That life is the only place in which the peace and joy we all desire can be found. Faith in Christ sets us free from sin. But to enjoy this life, we must exercise and apply that faith to life's everyday situations. It isn't enough to know what the Bible says. God calls us into a close relationship that causes us to want to please Him. We will all stumble and fall along the way, but a close walk with the Lord should encourage us to repent and get back on the right path—to restore our relationship with Him.

Knowing and speaking the Word isn't enough. We must live it. Whether you are a doer of the Word or you are only a hearer of the Word, it's your decision, so choose well.

Dear Father God, forgive me for reading Your Word but then going my own way. I pray that You will fill me with Your Holy Spirit so that Your Word will become a living part of me and that I will live to please You. Help me apply Your instruction clearly in my life. A View of Trucking in Romania

n mid-March of this year I traveled to Romania to visit my son, Doug, and his family, who are missionaries in that country. Doug, pastor Gigi, and I had a good time preaching and singing in three different churches (I met Pastor Gigi when I was there in 2005). I was able to share about the TFC ministry at each church.

During that time we visited with fellow missionaries Melvyn and Bonnie Van Horn, who live in Lugoj, where they have a truck stop, and Melvyn and Bonnie took us there for a meal. It was interesting to see a little bit of what it's like to be a trucker in Romania. The restaurant was somewhat similar to what we have here in the USA. The parking lot for the trucks was all fenced in, for safety reasons. Melvyn introduced me to the owner of the truck stop, who is a born-again Christian.

I learned that most trucks over there are single-axle cabovers with 40-foot, three-axle trailers. The main reason for that is because of the narrow roads and streets they have to travel on. There were very few four-lane highways. The truck stop was located off A-6, one of their few highways. It reminded me of the old US-60, US-40, and US-48 we used to have to travel years ago, back in the '60s when I started driving—horseshoe turn, drop-off on one side and a wall on the other! Highway A-6 is not done all the way

yet; they are working on through the mountain part of it. There are other places for trucks to stop, like little fuel-and-go stops and mini-markets. We stopped at a rest stop on A-1, and it didn't look too different from what we have over here, except that there are no coffee and snack vending machines.

And I learned something interesting in this trip. On my way to Romania I stopped in Germany, where I was told trucks cannot run on weekends—they have to shut down from Friday night until Monday morning. Imagine trying to do this over here!

Safe Under His Wings

t was a warm, sunny Sunday afternoon. It was a relief after the cold, rainy days we were experiencing, as we wondered if spring would ever arrive. Pearl and I were sitting on our lawn chairs in the backyard taking in the warmth of the sun while being serenaded by the songbirds in their own response to the pleasant day.

The serenity of the afternoon was disturbed by a sudden commotion. Seeing dust billowing from the small chicken coop out by the garden I hustled over, instantly thinking I knew what was happening. Let me interject here that Penny, our motherly silkie hen, just two days prior was rewarded for her faithful egg-sitting with the arrival of two cute chicks. (Over the past two years she has been responsible for hatching and mothering seven chicks that have become a part of our existing flock.)

Back to the commotion and dust. As I opened the door, I found Penny toe to toe, or rather beak to beak, with one of our more mature Rhode Island Red hens. If Mrs. Red disliked these two little intruders, Penny was not going to allow her children to be attacked and promptly let her know what's what. You could say it was much like a David and Goliath situation if you know the size difference of these two birds.

The following day, as I was walking past the chicken coop, I heard a persistent clucking coming from Penny. She was outside in the pen with only one of her chicks. I assumed the other one was still inside and she was encouraging it to come out but it wouldn't or thought it couldn't walk down that steep ramp to the ground. I opened the door to observe what was going on. I am not versed in chicken-ese, but I am sure Penny was doing her best to convince and encourage her little one that everything was okay and to come on down. But that wasn't enough. Penny came bouncing up the ramp and stood at the exit clucking and moving as if she were going down the ramp, hoping her chick would follow; but the chick didn't follow. Do you have the picture? What do you do now, Mama? She walked over to her chick, clucking, and extended her one wing to surround the chick in a motion to follow as we might take the hand of our son or daughter, encouraging them to follow.

At that moment tears began to build up and trickle down my face as I pictured the words of King David in Psalm 17:6-9 (NIV 1984): "I call on you, O God, for you will answer me; give ear to me and hear my prayer. Show the wonder of your great love, you who save by your right hand those who take refuge in you from their foes. Keep me as the apple of your eye; hide me in the shadow of your wings from the wicked who assail me, from my mortal enemies who surround me." In that moment I felt a warm reassurance in the realization of His promise to me, His leading and sheltering me every day. Is it only when I feel secure and comfortable that I feel He cares for me? Is He caring for me only if my life is without pain and struggle or I am secure and comfortable? No— His love and caring is with me every moment, whether I feel it or not. How often do I stop and realize and give Him thanks for that?

My mind went back to the previous day, seeing Penny standing up for her chicks, which evoked the picture of David again acknowledging God's protection in Psalm 91:4 NIV): "He will cover you with his feathers, and under his wings you will find refuge; his faithfulness will be your shield and rampart." Jesus Himself reminded the people how He longed to gather them under His wings as a hen would gather her chicks, but they were not willing (Matthew 23:37).

As I would lift Penny up to check the chicks, this peaceful feeling would well up within me. How safe those chicks must feel to be under those wings. It's a reminder to thank my Heavenly Father that I can live under the protection of His wings each and every day. How about you, driver?

We can't get our children to fledge. Husband Vince says it's because they are homing pigeons. I say they are swallows and I'm seriously considering calling our house Capistrano.

Obviously, having eleven growing—and grown-up—kids means there are always some of them coming for a visit, staying for a while, or leaving children or possessions with us temporarily. Daughter Ruthie, our most recent visitor, glanced at a photo of our front hall, which I'd used in an article I did for *Victorian Homes* magazine, and shook her head.

"Nice picture, Mom," she said, "but, somehow, it just doesn't look right." Our youngest, Rosemary, drawled, "That's because there's no luggage in the picture."

Most of our kids are either still living at home or in that great state of flux known as graduate school. They share apartments with other students, but our house is their permanent address, from which I have had to forward so much mail I'm thinking of applying for post-office status. Letters I don't mind, but fishing rods? That request came from our eighth child and sixth son, Tony, who "met a girl."

Of course he did; he mentioned this on his last visit. He also called me after his return to school to request I mail him two fishing rods and reels and a box of fishing tackle so he could teach her to fish.

Well, I figured any girl willing to learn to fish to please my son was a keeper, so I went to the basement to comply. The tackle box and reels were no problem at all. I found two of those rodlength mailing cases for the rods themselves. Not that my boys ever used them for storing the rods; they usually just leaned them against my washing machine. I packed them carefully and typed out address labels for the two rod cases and the box of tackle and reels.

When I called the UPS man to pick them up, he said they would only take them if a metal or wooden stake as long as the rod itself was inserted in the mailing cases so the fishing rods wouldn't be snapped in two as they went down the package chute.

That made sense. However, the fishermen in the family always unpacked



the rods when they arrived and must have destroyed the mailing rods or they would be leaning against my washing machine, too.

In desperation, I called Tony for any suggestions. With a long-suffering sigh, he said, "Put them on the bus, Mom."

"If you think for one minute I'm going to pay for a bus ticket for fishing equipment, Tony..."

"I wouldn't expect you to, Mom," he said patiently, "but the bus company ships merchandise, too."

(Incidentally, he never told me if the girl enjoyed the fishing trip, but I

suspect she either refused or went reluctantly. In either case, she obviously didn't prove to be "a keeper," worthy of Vince's driving the rods to the bus station, since we never heard of her again.)

Years later, after Vince had died, Tony met and married my dear daughter-in-law Kathy, who gladly has gone fishing with Tony, which is pure joy to me.

Two of the truckers had brand new \$100,000 K-Woppers (Kenworth). The third had an old dilapidated IH-Transtar. He asked the other two, 'Where did you get these large car chicken trucks loaded with all those chicken lights?' 'Oh,' said the first driver, 'I opened my Bible, put my finger down by faith and it hit on Revelation 21:21, which says, 'The street of the city was pure gold. 'The second also played Bible roulette, and his finger landed on Ecclesiastes 7:14, which says, 'In the day of prosperity be joyful. 'The third driver couldn't wait to get home and open his Bible. Bankruptcy seems to be very common these days. There was a time when the only debts most people had were the mortgages on their home and payments on their cars. All other items were paid in cash. If you didn't have the extra money to buy something, you would save until you could buy it.

Now many people have "maxed out" their credit cards, some owing \$10,000 to \$15,000 with interest from 12% to 22% and late fees. Add to that the pressure of divorced couples with child support expenses or the exhausted couples who are working two jobs to make ends meet. In desperation many people have come to the end of available resources and have gone to churches for help. Many churches will help these dear hearts slowly yet practically get out of debt. As a pastor I had the joy of seeing a new Christian couple sell their house, cut up all their

credit cards, and pay the bank over \$70,000. Today they are in ministry and their son is a youth pastor.

As a chaplain my heart was grieved in November when I heard a television evangelist say the Lord had told him that if the viewers would send him \$1,000 or more right away all their debts would be burned and gone by Thanksgiving Day. On another occasion, a friend gave me a book that went to over 100,000 people. The book was inspirational until the point where the writer wrote this prayer, "Father, while speaking these words to the reader today I feel a stirring in my heart." The stirring was for twelve friends and partners to send him \$8,500. He would then enter into agreement for a thousandfold return. He concluded his deception by saying, "It is done, in Jesus' name, now! If you are one of the twelve, write me a personal note today."

Before I line my bird cage with the paper of his book, let me tell you what Jesus says in Matthew 13:22-23: "Now he who received seed among the thorns is he who hears the word, and the cares of this world and the deceitfulness of riches choke the word, and he becomes unfruitful. But he who received seed on the good ground is he who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and produces: some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty." Those who love this world and love money will choke. True prosperity and everlasting riches are found in putting Jesus first, following Him and using all your resources to help bring the lost to Christ. In the economy of Heaven, Chapter Eleven means to get your house in order because your soul may be required to stand before God today to give an account to Him who will judge what we have done with our life and our riches.
