A Tribute to Pastor Charles Warren, Key Supporter of the TFC Ministry in Beaverdam

astor Charles Warren was a supporter and encourager of the ministry of TFC in Beaverdam from its inception. "He was man with a wonderful heart for missions; he and his wife served in India for thirty-nine years," recalls Beaverdam Lead



Chaplain David Lugibihl. "After returning to the States he served at several churches before coming to the Bluffton, Ohio, area. When the idea of a trucker's chapel in Beaverdam was mentioned to him, he was behind us all the way."

Pastor Warren was one of the original group of men who for more than ten years gathered to pray for a chapel at Beaverdam. They faithfully prayed and waited for the Lord to answer, and today two chapels across the road from each other are open to bless the truckers who stop at the Pilot and Flying J Travel Plazas.

"Pastor Warren was always an encourager at our monthly prayer breakfasts," Chaplain David adds. "He gave us many talks on keeping the faith and persevering in this ministry, with the ultimate goal of leading truckers to Christ."

"Pastor Warren always had a kind word for each of us. He would share Scriptures just at the right time and it would be the exact words needed at that moment." ~ Pastor Rick Lamb

"Pastor Warren could 'work the room' and would make an effort to talk to each one in the time he had, and would make them feel important. Pastor Warren told about his experience of meeting with a member of the highest Hindu caste every week for several months, until the man stopped coming; 'Rich' he said, 'you still have to try and not give up.' Pastor Warren could say more in five to ten minutes than most pastors would say in half an hour!" ~ TFC Chaplain Rich Lehman

"Pastor Warren always had a sermon ready to use for any event—such as going into a prison to minister. When you asked him how he was doing, he would reply, 'I have good days and bad days,' especially when he was having a bad one." ~ Jim Spallinger

Dealing with Dispatch

KW: (Clearly annoyed) Come on guys, you know we start these weekly calls at 8:40 PM (CT). Both of you got on late and I need to get off right at 9:00.

Pete: Sorry, Ken. The shower schedule at this truck stop was behind this evening.

KW: Not much of an excuse. I count on these calls.

Mac: Aye, Ken, what's up? This doesn't sound like you at all. Something eatin' you?

KW: (Pause) Yeah. Sorry, guys. You *are* my best friends. I shouldn't take this out on you.

Pete: Well, the thing about our phone friendship is that we can be upfront with each other—the good, the bad, and the awkward. So, what IS going on, friend?

KW: I had a blow-up with my dispatcher about an hour ago. She thinks she needs to tell me every step to take. How do you spell m-i-c-r-o-m-a-n-ag-e? I've been assigned to this same person for the past four months and there has been tension since day one.

Mac: That friction can make driving miserable, all right. Too many of my friends have changed companies or quit driving altogether because of driver manager stress. I'm so glad I'm an O/O. Pete: You never have difficulties working with brokers?

Mac: The odd time, but generally, it's pretty good.

Pete: Ken, in my experience, difficul-

ties between people are because of two things. Sometimes it's a personality collison; sometimes it's a communication snafu. Usually the two come together to create thunderstorms.

KW: I'm not sure I follow. I think I'm a pretty easy-going guy.

Pete: That's what I'd say too, but let me ask you this—what is getting your goat with this dispatcher? What button is she pushing that annoys the daylights out of you?

KW: OK, here's an example. I was fifteen minutes late for a delivery yesterday. No big deal. The receiver had some flexibility but Sheena—that's her name—took the opportunity to point out that I should have taken a different route that would have shaved off five minutes of travel time. I explained that her route has ongoing construction and I would have been even further delayed. She responded that I'm new and just don't know how to manage my time.

Mac: So, sounds like your button is that Sheena is implying that you're not smart enough or experienced enough to make your own route decisions.

KW: Yeah, I guess so. I'm no dummy and I think I've been doing pretty well at driving. It's nearly a year for me. *Pete*: Ken, if you had to guess, what buttons get Sheena amped up?

Pete: Give a simple, genuine compliment on occasion. But mostly, ask God to help you foster a better relationship. Pray for her to see God's grace—and you show her some of that grace.

KW: Am I the one that has to do everything?!

Mac: Ah, no, Kenny, my boy. But you are the only one you have control over. You make your good choices and see how the other person responds.

Someone's Knocking at Your Door

t's Halloween night, and there's a knock at your door. On the other side are children in cute costumes holding out pumpkin-shaped plastic buckets hoping for candy. When the older children arrive at your door, they call out, "Trick or treat!" and you gladly pass out a treat so they aren't tempted to "trick" instead.

Is this holiday just harmless fun, or is there a darker side to Halloween that we need to be aware of? American spending to celebrate Halloween is second only to Christmas, and more chocolate is sold at Halloween than Easter or Valentine's Day.

One of the primary Halloween colors is indicative of the dark side of this holiday, as people decorate for parties with black streamers and dress in black witches' or sorcerers' costumes. And Halloween activites don't usually begin until after dark. Ghosts are another popular costume, but are these friendly characters or do they open the door to evil spirits?

The Bible warns against opening your life to the wiles of the devil: "...and do not give the devil a foothold" (Ephesians 4:27). "For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms" (Ephesians 6:12).

And Jesus warns us about the devil in John 8:44, "...He was a murderer from the beginning, not holding to the truth, for there is no truth in him. When he lies, he speaks his native language, for he is a liar and the father of lies."



How a Trucker Played a Key Role in the Quecreek Mine Rescue

I clearly remember the night of July 23, 2002; we were in a motel after attending an antique truck show when we turned on the TV and saw the unfolding story of the Quecreek Mine rescue at nearby Somerset, Pennsylvania.

Two teams were working at the mine, two hundred feet below ground. One team was at the highest elevation of the mine, the other at the lowest. At the highest elevation a continuous mining of what was thought to be solid wall broke through, releasing what turned out to be over 150 million gallons of water. This older mine had been closed for several years and its location was not accurately shown on the map. One of the miners, Dennis Hall, ran for the phone to warn the other team. Because of the call, the miners in the lower section were able to escape. The nine in the higher elevation were trapped.

They were working in a seam only four feet high, so they could not even stand. They helped each other to the highest point of that section and at one point had to turn their faces to the roof just to find enough air to breathe over the rising water. Helpless, all they could do was wait and pray in the cold, wet dark-

ness. They tied themselves together so if they died they all would be found.

On the surface, families and state officials were gathered at the local fire hall. waiting and praying. Governor Schweiker was among that group, helping where he could, talking with the reporters, and encouraging families. At the site, two teams of surveyors frantically plotted out where the men might be. One team used conventional landmark methods; the other, GPS positioning. The first of what turned out to be a series of miracles happened when both teams' results came within six inches of each other. The first bore hole drilled was to allow air to be pumped where they hoped the men were, while at another location, a bore hole wasdrilled to allow water to be pumped out. Teams of specialists arrived, and the right equipment was located and delivered, along with experts to run them.

They needed huge pumps to get the water out as soon and as fast as possible. A trucker on the Pennsylvania Turnpike, on his way to Indiana to deliver two such pumps, heard about it on the radio and, without even getting permission and knowing he could lose his job, he

headed for Somerset with the needed pumps! Even though there were some pumps already working, those two pumps made the difference between life and death in keeping the water from filling the mine, as 35,000 gallons per minute were steadily pumped out of the mine.

Meanwhile, the drill to get the miners some air was also making progress, but then the drill bit broke. Another miracle hap-



pened when several men in a machine shop in Jefferson County were able to design and cast a new bit driver overnight (something that would normally take three to four days) and have it delivered by a National Guard helicopter. When they finally broke through after seventy hours of drilling, they found they had hit a place very close to the men. What a relief! Rejoicing erupted when the first contact was finally made! The team's foreman tapped nine times on the pipe, signaling that all nine were alive; that was confirmed when a cable and mike with an attached glow stick were lowered so they could communicate with them.

A ten-foot-tall rescue capsule, stored for thirty years and never used, was rushed in from another state. Blankets, food, flashlights, and other essentials were loaded in the capsule and lowered to the men. Then began the process of bringing them up one at a time. It took ten minutes to bring the first man up, but only five by the last one. The last miner asked for a few extra moments alone in that potential grave to thank the Lord for His goodness!

People from around the world called, e-mailed, and most important, prayed as they got the news. There is no question that Almighty God was powerfully present at every turn, as they looked back at all the miracles that resulted in a joyful end to the whole ordeal.

We left at 10:30 PM!
- ♦ Eric came in today; he is a Christian and it was a breath of fresh air, for it has been awhile since anyone has come in. He is a trainer and he drove all night and wanted to come over and pray before he went to bed.
- ◆ Anthony, a Christian driver, came in for prayers and some fellowship.
- ♦ One truck driver came in tonight to express his appreciation for the Mobile Chapels and the chaplains who serve the Lord's work.
- ♦ A man by the name of Armando came into the chapel and we had quite a discussion about the Holy Spirit, Jesus, and the God the Father. He is originally from Brazil, South America.
- ♦ A woman came into the chapel seeking prayer for her son's tractor trailer. It seems the linkage to the accelerator had malfunctioned. We prayed for the Lord's intervention.

reen Onion and his friend and teammate, Hog Caller, were rolling down I-95 going 95 when a Smokey Bear pulled them over for speeding. Green Onion was making all kinds of excuses—the urgency of the run, his dispatcher's insistence to get this perishable load to its destination lest it spoil, and so on. The officer told Green Onion he would let him go with a warning ticket. Being overly tired and in a jovial mood, Hog Caller said to Smokey Bear, "Why don't you give Green Onion season tickets? His hobby is collecting warning tickets from every state of the Union." There was very little talking in the cab the rest of the run!

I wonder how many of us are collecting "warning tickets" from the Holy Spirit? He came to convict us of the sin of not believing in Jesus Christ, the only true God and Messiah. He did not come to condemn us, but to help us believe and to give us true joy and the peace of knowing our sins are forgiven when we trust Him.

And we all need forgiveness. "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God," the Bible says in Romans 3:23 and then goes on to say, in 6:23, "For the wages of sin is death" (eternal separation from God). The warning ticket is, "It is appointed for men to die once, but after this the judgment, so Christ was offered once to bear the sins of many. To those who eagerly wait for Him He will appear a second time, apart from sin, for salvation" (Hebrews 9:27-28 NKJV). It is God's will to use us as His servants to warn the world that He is not willing to see any perish, but all come to repentance. We preach by our life and lips that "God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world through Him might be saved" (John 3:17 NKJV). The Apostle Paul said to the Colossians, "God willed to make known what are the riches of the glory of this mystery...which is Christ in you, the hope of glory. Him we preach, warning every man and teaching every man in all wisdom, that we may present every man perfect in Christ Jesus" (Colossians 1:27-28 NKJV).

Jesus gave us another warning: "Then if anyone says to you, 'Look, here is the Christ!' or 'There!' do not believe it. For false christs and false prophets will rise and show great signs and wonders to deceive" (Matthew 24:23 NKJV). Satan's counterfeits say Jesus was just a man, an angel, a prophet, an example, a myth, or just a good moral teacher to follow.

But He is our Savior who "humbled Himself and became obedient to the point of death, even the death of the cross. Therefore God also has highly exalted Him and given Him the name which is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of those in heaven, and of those on earth, and of those under the earth, and that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (Philippians 2:9-11 NKJV). We are warned that "Nor is there salvation in any other, for there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved" (Acts 4:12 NKJV).

But we also have this wonderful promise: "If you confess with your mouth the Lord Jesus and believe in your heart that God has raised Him from the dead, you will be saved. For with the heart one believes unto righteousness, and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation" (Romans 10:9-10 NKJV). We believe that salvation is by faith in Jesus Christ alone, not in a religionist organized system, personal convictions, ideas, theology, astrology or philosophy, but in Jesus. "Now to the King eternal, immortal, invisible, to God who alone is wise, be honor and glory forever and ever. Amen" (I Timothy 1:17 NKJV). 🛡

Wrapped in Words of Hope

An Uplifting Lesson from the Weeping Prophet

"Wherever you are, be all there!" I remembered that quote from *The Journals of Jim Elliot* recently as a friend and I were talking about finding contentment. We recalled occasions in our lives when we found ourselves wishing we could be somewhere else, doing something else, instead of being fully committed

to the place and situation where God had placed us.

It took me back to some words I'd written years ago, and the insights felt like they'd come straight out of that conversation with my friend. My daily reading had just taken me through Isaiah, my favorite Old Testament book. My heart sang through the words of chapter 40, from "comfort my people" to "those who wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength." I'd cried again at the heart-wrenching drama of chapter 53, remembering that His suffering had been for me; and

rejoiced with the promises of chapters 61 and 62. Granted, Isaiah warned of judgment, but his words are always tempered and flavored with hope.

Then...there followed Jeremiah, a book that chronicles the rebellion of God's people and their downfall. Time after time, Jeremiah warned them of impending judgment; time after time, his warnings were ignored. Finally, he saw his stubborn nation defeated by its enemies and taken captive into exile. No wonder he's known as the "weeping prophet"!

I used to approach Jeremiah with a sigh. Isaiah comforted me and challenged me. Jeremiah? He depressed me. He wept a lot while proclaiming God's warnings of discipline and judgment over a disobedient people. Still, both Isaiah and Jeremiah were mouthpieces for the same God, showcasing His righteousness and mercy, not as contrasting, but as complementing facets of His character. Comfort and



warning...both messages were needed, and each message needed the right messenger. Each prophet fulfilled a specific call in God's plan.

It made me think of the Body of Christ, the Church. Each one of us has been appointed by the Lord for a specific role within the Body—be it a truck driver, homemaker, teacher, pastor, computer whiz, you name it—and we are to fulfill that role to the best of our ability (or, rather, by the Lord's ability in us).

Sometimes we may think our role is not important, or too difficult, and we wish we could be somewhere else, doing something else (ever felt like that?). Even Jeremiah expressed that wish. He wanted to leave his prophetic role, which had only brought him persecution and distress: "Then I said, 'I will not make mention of him, nor speak anymore in his name'" (Jeremiah 20:9 NKJV). Yet he came to find out that running from God's plan

was worse: "But his word was in my heart like a burning fire shut up in my bones; I was weary of holding it back, and I could not." And he realized that, regardless of how unrewarding his mission may seem to be, his delight should not be on the results of his message or ministry, but on the Word of the One who had called him: "Your words were found, and I ate them, and Your word was to me the joy and rejoicing of my heart; for I am called by Your name, O LORD God of hosts" (Jeremiah 15:16 NKJV).

God used Jeremiah to warn a rebellious, idolatrous people about His impending judgment. But He

still had a message of hope for those who would repent: "'For I know the plans I have for you,' declares the Lord, 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future'" (Jeremiah 29:11).

That's our God. Even His warnings of discipline come to us wrapped in words of hope, if we will just repent and step back into His plan. And when that plan includes things that we would rather not face, we are reminded that our fulfillment should not be in results, success or our own wellbeing, but in walking in obedience and finding delight in doing His will. A pretty uplifting lesson, coming from a prophet who cried so much!

The Dangerous Sin of Nearness

Prior to one making a sinful decision, a series of circumstances play out, making temptation increasingly harder to resist. As temptation starts to build, turning away gets more difficult, but we do have the power to change direction and avoid letting dangerous circumstances influence us toward sin. When we choose to stick with those tempting circumstances instead of turning away, we are guilty of the sin-before-the-sin...getting too close, reaching the point of seemingly no return. To shine a big warning spotlight on it, I think of it as the sin of nearness.

The sin-before-the-sin involves the little decisions that seem insignificant, but they set us up for the fateful "final step," which is the decision to commit the sinful act itself. To overcome the enemy's strongholds that constantly pull us in the wrong direction, we have to come to a place of obedience. And the dirty word we are all afraid of is DISCIPLINE! We all know it's much easier to make a good decision now before the pressure begins to rise. We need to do everything possible to act while we have maximum control instead of waiting until our control and power dwindle and our vulnerability increases. When we have low power and high vulnerability, we sin. We all know what these occasions look like.

You know what Satan's stronghold is in your life...a substance, caffeine, alcohol, food, work, gossip, sarcasm, control, fear, worry, money, sex, loneliness, feeling overwhelmed or incompetent, anger, insecurity, failure, feeling victimized... For example, if Satan has a stronghold in your heart regarding food, then be aware of how you are feeding the supply lines of that stronghold. When you decide to stop at a fast food place, to walk into the kitchen, or to open the refrigerator door, you make it easier to be tempted to sin. Resisting these earlier steps cuts off the supply lines and weakens Satan's strongholds over time. That is why it gets easier each time you resist temptation.

Failing to eliminate stumbling blocks that lead to sin is a serious shortcoming for many of us. Sexual temptation has presented itself to most of us at some time in our lives. Today's scripture advises us to run from sexual sin. When you get close to sexual temptation, the flesh lights up. With sexual sin, the longer we are in the presence of temptation, the less likely we are to escape without sinning. It is so much better to avoid the-sin-before-the-sin ... to run from the sin of nearness. Don't turn on the computer in an isolated place; don't touch yourself; move that sexual image

out of your head; stop fantasizing; look away from cleavage; don't start that enticing conversation. You can apply these "leading-up-to" steps to any area of struggle.

The closer we get to the fleshly sensations of the sinful act, the harder it is to resist, especially when we are feeling down, lonely, bored, sad, overwhelmed, out of control, powerless, tired, beaten down. These feelings cripple our ability to run from the sin of nearness.

Today, take notice of the small decisions that lead up to the actual wrong decision. Draw a little map or timeline, so you can see the options you had that would have taken you away from sin instead of staying on the course that led to the sinful decision you chose. Resist the sin of nearness and cut off the supply lines and strangle the strongholds Satan has in your life. Stay in communication with Jesus. Turn to Him for the strength and discernment you need. Whether you avoid the sin of nearness or you continue to get closer and misjudge your ability to quickly get away without damage is your decision, so choose well.

Prayer

Dear Father God, help me notice the many warnings and opportunities You give me to turn to You when I am on the path to sin. Help me recognize my stumbling blocks. Help me be a better steward of the "little" decisions that lead up to the "bigger" decisions. I can only do this through submission to Your Holy Spirit guiding me in Your wisdom and empowering my actions. In particular, help me to run from all temptation that leads to (fill in your biggest weakness). Help me to run away from this sin and toward You. I pray this in the name of the One You sent to teach me how to resist temptation, Jesus Christ. Amen.

What Is Truth?

Values are worthless unless there is a standard from which they are drawn.

verybody is so sure that what they believe is right. Because of this, marriages end in divorce, business partnerships break up, sports teams experience fighting among players because of ultra-inflated egos, resulting in the team not performing at its full potential.

Everybody has an opinion or conviction about life in general. We may jokingly say to one another, "I don't discuss politics or religion," yet the fabric of our lives is woven with political and religious views. Those views are formed mainly from our culture and position in life, and often form a barrier between us and those who think differently from us. To blend our differences calls for strength to cross that barrier.

Problems arise when we refuse to see, hear, or acknowledge another person's idea, conviction, or argument. This happens even with people of similar beliefs; how much greater is the strife when convictions and ideologies clash. Each is as sure he is right as the next. But so often what we deem right is merely a preference—not a life or death matter.

The definition and use of words can cause much confusion. We discuss much about what we value, but when we speak of our values, we may mean something completely different from what someone else means.

The term "values" is directly associated with a standard of truth. Values are worthless unless there is a standard from which they are drawn. Some in the political arena flippantly speak of "values" being important to them while ignoring and defaming the "standard of truth." They characterize the fatal belief today that says, "Truth is whatever you make it to be."

There was a government official who once posed the same question many are asking today: "What is truth?"

Pilate asked that question after Jesus stated, "You are right in saying I am a king. In fact, for this reason I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone on the side of truth listens to me" (John 18:37). Earlier, Jesus had told those who believed in Him, "If you hold to my teaching, you are really my disciples. Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free" (John 8:31-32).

We lost sight of the truth when we rebelled against God. But today each of us has the God-given privilege to make a choice. Do I desire to obey God and live by His truth (that is learned from the Bible) or rebel against Him and live outside truth? It does not become a matter of whether I am right, but is what I believe to be right governed by truth?

It is no wonder we flounder in confusion and pain when we do not plan our trip through this life by using God's "Road Map," the standard that brings stability and peace to a nation and its people.

Driver, even if our nation and churches neglect the Road Map, you and I dare not, for it provides the standard by which we can know and do what is right in God's sight.
