## A Word from Scott

An Admonition

Just last week I was on my way to the TFC office and enjoying a scenic view of the Three Mile Island nuclear plant on the Susquehanna River (actually wishing I was fishing) when I ran up on a big rig with his flashers going. At each of several side roads he slowed as

if looking for a turn he had to make. Finally he pulled off onto the shoulder, so I pulled up next to him, rolled down the window, and asked if he needed help. He yelled something I couldn't hear clearly, so I pulled over, got out, and walked back to where he was now standing. Turns out he was heading to the Armstrong plant right next to our office and he also needed some petrol (he was Canadian). I told him where he could fuel up and that led to a discussion of price per liter in Canada vs. price per gallon in the U.S.—two different standards of measure for the same fuel. He followed me to Armstrong, waved a thank you, and was on his way.

Our exchange got me to thinking once again about one of the fundamental difficulties we face as a ministry trying to bring the Gospel of Jesus to truck drivers. That difficulty is the standard(s), or lack thereof, that people use to measure a political or religious position, and more importantly, truth. In today's culture each individual becomes their own subjective standard and so truth becomes "self-created." That individual standard of measure effectively eliminates authority, insulates people from external criticisms, and isolates individuals from all but those who totally agree with them. Most would agree that this is a "liberal" worldview. Perhaps not, though. Because what is thought to be broad-minded is really narrow-minded; what is thought to be intellectually liberal is actually uncritical and unreflective; that which is thought to be liberating is actually totally constricting...it is thinking which confines people to a solitary and dark prison of self-obsession. Just listen and you will hear it everywhere!

So, what do we do? First, I believe we need to understand our culture and how it reacts to the exclusive claims of Christianity. Next, we need to understand how Jesus met people at their point of need and understanding, and how Paul translated Jesus' teaching into his own proclamation to the Corinthians when he "gave up his rights as an apostle" so he could "become all things to all men" in order that "he might save some."

I fully believe the words attributed to Francis of Assissi are meant for us today: "At all times preach the Gospel, when necessary use words." No matter whether it is the U.S., Canada, Russia, Africa, or Brazil, we have to live lives as children in God's Kingdom so others look in and see something they want and ask us to give an account for the hope that is within us (1 Peter 3:15).



In high school I drifted into "peer pressure" (drinking), but got straightened out and repented after an accident. I became involved in the church and did everything from singing and teaching to being a deacon. I also started volunteering as a chaplain.

Then my life took another downward spiral when I drifted from God's Word and prayer, and became involved in pornography. I succumbed to the temptation and was caught in a sting operation and I served ten days for a misdemeanor charge. I learned through that experience how much the devil loves to trip us up. I had left my first love for Christ and allowed the worldly desires to take over. I feel the Lord spared me from going any further down that dangerous path [through that sting operation]. I got back to the Lord, repented of my sins, and by God's grace corrected my life; but my marriage of twenty-four years was in shambles because of my actions.

I know God can still use me as long as I keep Him first in my life. He has wonderful plans for me and I'm willing to be used for His glory. God has definitely given me a second chance, and I am now serving as a chaplain at, of all places, the Second Chance Chapel in Beaverdam. I thank the Lord for the trials I've faced and look forward to how I can be used for His kingdom.

## Are You Looking for Peace?

ecently a driver came into our chapel and blurted out, "Why do I do this?" I had no idea what he was talking about, until he explained that he'd just spent \$400.00 at the casino. "And why do I drink alcohol, why do I use tobacco, why do I go with women that do?" he went on, and added, "I'm going to hell where I will be in agony forever." Yet he would not accept the forgiveness and hope Jesus offered him.

The message I shared with that driver is the same I want to share with you; it's a message of hope. Actually, it is more than just hope; it is true assurance that offers peace. The current state of our world is anything but peaceful; but God wants you to enjoy a heart of peace, the peace that comes from being forgiven. Scripture reminds us in John 3:16, "For God so loved the world [you and me] that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life."\* God sent His one and only Son to this world for the express reason to save us from sin and to give us lasting peace. Why did Jesus leave heaven's glory? Because, as the Apostle Paul writes in Romans, we all have sinned and come short of the glory of God, and the wages of sin is death—but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord (Romans 3:23, 6:23).

In John 17:4, we are permitted to eavesdrop on a conversation between Jesus and His Father: "I have glorified you on the earth. I have finished the work which You

gave Me to do." That work was to seek and to save the lost, but that came at a high price. Right after He prayed that prayer, a gang of soldiers came to arrest Him. Later they spat on His face, slapped Him, placed a crown of thorns on His head, beat Him with leather straps, and finally nailed Him to a cross. Scripture tells us they bruised Jesus beyond recognition.

We find another conversation between Jesus and His Father in Matthew 27:46: "And about the ninth hour Jesus cried out with a loud voice, saying, 'Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani?' that is, 'My God, My God, why have You forsaken Me?'" God turned His back on Jesus at that moment because Jesus was carrying on Himself the full burden of humanity's sin.

But He rose again on the third day, and offers free forgiveness and a new life to all who will come to Him. Go with me to 1 John 1:9: "If we confess our sin He [Jesus] is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness."

If you are looking for peace, hope, and assurance, I invite you to pray the prayer below, from your heart. Then, the next time you come by a chapel, tell the chaplain about your decision.

# "Peace, Be Still!"

hey were one scared bunch of guys! Forget macho toughness. Those hardened fishermen were terrified, and no wonder. The way things looked, come morning their wives would be applying for widows' pension. But there was one with them in the boat who, in the midst of all the stormy furor, was sleeping peacefully. Finally in their terror, they woke Him up, crying, "Do you not care that we are perishing?"



He arose. And with one command, "Peace, be still!" — He calmed wind and lake, and their fears as well. But once all was quiet, He addressed them with a mild rebuke: "Why are you so fearful? How is it that you have no faith?" (See Mark 4:35-41; Luke 8:2-25).

I've heard many sermons explaining why Jesus rebuked His disciples; but thinking about it this time, a light came on. There was one obvious reason why they shouldn't have doubted or feared. Jesus was there. In that boat. With them. Sinking or floating, they were safe.

There is a prophet in the Old Testament who faced a different kind of storm throughout his life. We've just finished six months of studying Jeremiah and Lamentations in Sunday School, and I was struck like never before by the sense of grief that permeates this prophet's message. He saw his nation torn apart by storms of its own making — brought about by their disobedience, their rebellion, their idolatry, their blatant disregard for God. The nation destroyed, its leaders killed, its people taken captive, Jeremiah himself taken into exile... I wondered how, in the midst of all this, he could still say, "Yet this I call to mind and therefore I have hope: Because of the LORD's great love we are not consumed, for his compassions never fail. They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness" (Lamentations 3:21-23).

He could say it because he knew that the storms had not taken God off the throne. He was there. With His people. Even in exile. They were suffering the consequences of their own sins, but He had not abandoned them. They could trust His faithfulness.

I pick up the paper in the morning or turn on the news in the evening and see storms everywhere. In wars and rumors of wars... in innocent people blown apart by deranged zealots... in countries still bent on genocide... in moral standards falling to new lows every day... in the moral fiber of nations eroding from within... in a culture that seems bent on self-destruction. I wonder what Jeremiah would say were he to read this morning's headlines! Evil seems to be compounding, and values eroding. Standing for something means being intolerant and the only acceptable moral value seems to be that "anything goes."

Do you, like me, sometimes feel like crying out, "Lord, wake up! This boat is sinking! Can't You see we're perishing?" Or maybe there's a personal storm in your life today, and you feel you're being buffeted from every side and just about to sink. You want this storm to be over, you want the waves and the wind to calm down, you want a respite!

May we, with the eyes of faith, see Him stand up, speak peace to the storms, and accept His gentle rebuke: "Why are you so fearful?" He promised, "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give unto you: not as the world giveth, give I unto you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid" (John 14:27 KJV).

Just as He spoke peace to the raging storm on the Sea of Galilee and spoke peace to the heart of Jeremiah while the storms continued raging around him, He can speak peace to your heart and mine today — regardless of the circumstances.

# A Double Feature on Improving Your Health (At Home or on the Road)

#### Weight Management Checkup

Let's face the facts—diet is a four-letter word that begins with DIE. However, with the physical requirements imposed by the DOT, drivers are facing the need to lose weight and get healthier if they want to keep their jobs. According to the DOT requirements, medical fitness is required for duty—this includes weight management as well as management of associated problems such as high blood pressure and cholesterol, sleep apnea, and a host of other weight-related medical conditions. Losing weight for work-related reasons is important, but it is also important for improving your overall lifestyle. And it helps if you focus on "health" rather than "diet."



Not feeling up to a full-fledged weight loss plan? Start with small goals of ten-pound increments. An initial goal of reducing your baseline weight by 10% is a start and will have an effect on many health risks. Here are a few tips to lose ten pounds the easy way (okay, the not-too-hard way):

• Drink plenty of water

- Divide your normal portion in half; save the rest for later
- Skip the meat; even a couple of meatless meals help with weight reduction
- Eat fresh foods and reduce your consumption of canned and pre-packaged foods
- Cut sugar and (white) flour from your diet; these white ingredients cause weight gain and bloating
- Take short walking breaks whenever possible; every little bit adds up
- Fill two-thirds of your plate with vegetables for fewer calories and more nutrition
- Skip sugary drinks; a supersized soda can have over 500 calories
- Green tea is an excellent antioxidant and aids in weight loss (but skip the milk and sugar)
- Non-creamy soups are good fillers; add a cup to your meal
- Yogurt is a great way to get nutrition and keep a healthy weight
- Diet two days a week and eat healthy the other five
- Increase your fiber intake—eat more beans, lentils, and unprocessed fruit; add garbanzo beans to your salad

#### A Word About Sodas

A recent report noted that the average American drinks 44.7 gallons of soda a year—enough to fill a small kiddie pool! Previous articles in this column have noted the caloric content of sodas, but here is another point to consider: citrus-flavored sodas contain a chemical called Brominated Vegetable Oil (BVO) which prevents the citrus flavors from separating from the drink. (Note: cola-flavored drinks do not contain BVO.) If you hold up a citrus-flavored beverage to the light, you can see cloudiness, an indication that the product contains BVO. But did you know that BVO is also used as a flame retardant? There is concern among scientists and nutritionists that BVO is harmful to the

human body. Some people who consume large amounts of this chemical have developed skin lesions, memory loss, and nerve disorders.

Regular sodas contain high fructose corn syrup (HFCS), a genetically modified food source. This product has only been on the market since the 1990s, and there is no long-term evidence against human consumption, but it does add high doses of sugar.

Generally, a soda or two won't be harmful. However, remember that sodas are empty calories. Substituting an alternative such as low-fat, regular or chocolate milk can go a long way towards giving your body the nutrients it needs.

## Show Me Your ID

ey, Green Onion," said Hog Caller, "more and more places I'm traveling to these days want to see my ID!" "Yeah, Hog," replied Green Onion, "and soon we will have to carry a passport on our phone; doesn't matter if we ever leave home!"

Do you remember when, back in the 1970s, many Christian programs were warning us not to get credit cards because they were the precursors of the mark of the beast? (You know, with all those barcodes.) How well I remember, back when Mary Ann and I traveled all over the country as missionaries with the Navigators. We carried only cash, traveling in our 1970 VW Beetle, and it broke down in North Dakota with (I am not kidding!) 66,600 miles on the odometer. Without a credit card, we couldn't rent a car, so with the \$300 cash we received for our broken-down VW we purchased a 1962 Chevrolet to get back across the border to Canada (the transmission failed shortly after we got home). We could just imagine what certain preachers would have made of that story!

The Bible warns us that there will be troubled times at the end—widespread wars and unrest ("wars and rumors of wars" as the King James Version words it). War was declared by Satan against Almighty God, and he also has declared war against us, who were created in God's image. He deceived Adam and Eve in the Garden, and probably thought he had achieved a huge victory.

But our Heavenly Father, in the fullness of time, sent His only beloved Son to defeat Satan on the cross, so that, now, "whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16). Our Heavenly Father sent Jesus not to judge or condemn anyone: "For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world; but to save the world through him" (John 3:17).

No one is outside of the reach of His love—from those stained and shamed by sin, the confused, the lost, the lonely, the demon possessed, the gang members who terrorize the inner cities, the terrorists who murder and

So we say with confidence, 'The Lord is my helper; I will not be afraid. What can man do to me?'" (Hebrews 13:5-6).

He offers us an eternal ID that can never be revoked or annulled. Our ID is that we are identified with Jesus Christ, the Son of God. We, like the Apostle Paul, want to know Him and the power of His resurrection and the fellowship of His suffering.
