On the Road with Sam & Bunny (& Susie, too!)

In the January edition of Highway News and Good News we reported on a trip Sam Rittenhouse and Bunny O'Hare (TFC Chaplain Care Team) took to the Midwest, visiting TFC staff and family along the way. The trip was such an encouragement to the local staff, they decided to repeat the adventure, this time heading south. Like before, they were accompanied by faithful little Susie-the-dog. This is Sam's report about the trip.

The purpose for trips like this is to make face-to-face contacts with our chaplains, both staff and volunteers, who serve at the various truck stops where we have chapels, especially since we have not been able to get together for staff conference for several years now, due to lack of funds. The visits are really appreciated by the chaplains and are meant to represent a listening ear from the home office about their concerns. Our chaplains are out there on the front lines, so to speak, and sometimes get discouraged, like we all do at times. So it is good and necessary to sit with them and encourage them in a face-to-face encounter. Bunny and I work in the Chaplain Care Department and do a lot of our work via phone, email,



webinars, etc., but there is nothing that compares to getting out to their locations and spending quality time with them.

And so we hit the road on March 27th, making our first stop in Hagerstown, Maryland, to have lunch with my sister and brother-in-law. After that we headed off to Wytheville, Virginia, to spend the evening with Chaplain Dave Nispel. Chaplain Dave is single and retired from OTR driving. Even while he was still driving he would lay over at truck stops where TFC had chapels and spend whatever time he could volunteering to give the chaplain some time off. Now he has become a much-appreciated presence among the staff of the truck stop.

After supper and a good night's rest, Tuesday morning we spent some more time with Dave before heading to Knoxville, where we had lunch with Chaplain Hank



Rader. We had a very good and productive conversation with him related to the ministry and the chaplain's role in it. (I may add here that both Dave and Hank have some serious health issues but keep plugging away because it is their deep desire to minister to drivers and truck stop employees). After spending a few hours with Hank, we decided to head for Nashville, arriving about 6:30 PM. We got to spend an hour or so with Volunteer Chaplain Ralph before heading to the motel for the night. Soon after we arrived there was a massive accident just beyond where we exited and we again thanked God for safety on the highway. ☹

Father and Son Reconcile

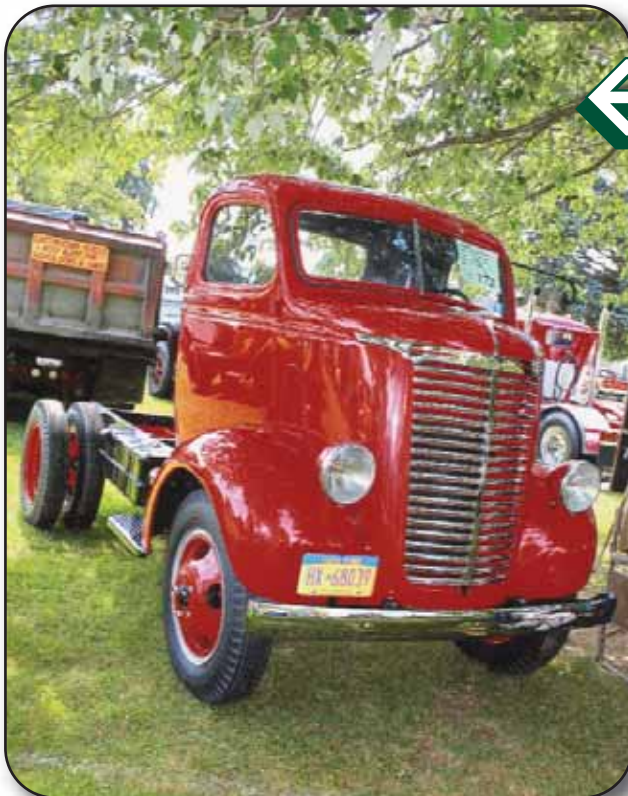

I suggested he write a letter to his father, expressing his feelings. Later on, he came back and showed me the letter, then he took a picture of it and texted it to his father. Chris told me that, as he was writing the letter, he could feel the release happening and that he felt "5,000 pounds lighter." He said that even if he didn't get a response from his father, he'd be okay with that.

The next day, when I was coming back to the chapel, I saw Chris sitting in his truck, which was parked next to the chapel, talking on his phone. He rolled down the window and said to me, "My father and I are having a conversation." I gave him a thumbs-up and walked into the chapel.

Chris came in, with tears in his eyes, just before the service started. He told me that he and his father just had a two-hour conversation that should have taken place twenty years before. They both forgave each other and they cried together. Needless to say, Chris was rejoicing because, in his words, "I have a father back!"

Chris knows the Lord as his Savior, and one of the questions he asked his father was, "Dad, do you go to church?" His father responded, "I accepted Christ as my Savior while I was in prison, but I don't attend a local church." Chris asked him if he would start going to church if he (Chris) asked him to, and his father said yes!

~ A Perfect Father's Day Card ~

It's been many years since I last bought a Father's Day card, as my dad passed away in 1984. Walking through a Hallmark store one day, watching people picking through cards, I found myself missing the old ritual of looking for just the right one that would express my love and appreciation in a way that I'd never been able to do verbally. My father was a good man, but he carried deep burdens and hurts that kept him from expressing love and affection, and kept his children at a distance. Throughout my childhood, he was what I later came to describe as an "absent presence." My sense of loss, when he died, was for more than losing him physically—I mourned for the relationship that never was.

Back to the card store... I started feeling that old sense of desolation, the sadness that always accompanies my memories of him—a desire to have known him better and to have had a better sense of the love that I now know was there.

Then words of a Scripture read a long time ago popped on the screen of my mind: "A Father to the fatherless... is the Lord in his holy dwelling" (Psalm 68:5). "You're not fatherless," I reminded myself. "You have the greatest Father anyone could wish for." Then a "crazy" idea crossed my mind... Why not pick a Father's Day card for God, thanking Him for all He has been and continues

to be for me as my perfect Heavenly Father?

I started thinking about what I would write in that card.

First and foremost, I would thank Him again for adopting me into His family by the new birth in Jesus Christ: "...you received the Spirit of adoption by whom we cry out, 'Abba, Father.' The Spirit Himself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God" (Romans 8:15-16 NKJV). When I first learned the actual meaning



of "Abba" I was stunned. The best English equivalent is "Daddy." You mean to say, God actually wants me to call Him "Dad"? But that's what it says there.

I would thank Him for being a Father who will never abandon me. He promised: "Never will I leave you; never will I forsake you" (Hebrews 13:5).

Also, for providing for me: "And my God will meet all your needs according to his glorious riches in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:19).

And I would thank Him for guiding me and giving me wisdom when I feel befuddled and confused (happens quite often!): "I will instruct you and teach you in the way you should go; I will counsel you and watch over you" (Psalm 32:8).

And there's so much more. But above all, I would thank Him for loving me and letting me know it! "I have loved you with an everlasting love," He says to me — and to each one of us. "I have drawn you with loving-kindness" (Jeremiah 31:3).

Obviously, there was no appropriate card in the store. But by the time I walked out, my Heavenly Daddy had gotten my card, sent from a heart overflowing with gratitude.

I have a Father in heaven Who cherishes me as His own, precious daughter. And He cherishes each one of us in this special way. We are His own creation, and every aspect of our person, even down to the quirks that may drive some of our friends "nuts," are part of His perfect plan. No, we're not perfect, but we are perfectly suited for the purpose for which our Heavenly Dad created us. And that's just one more reason to thank Him.

This Father's Day, why not write your own "Thank You" card to your Heavenly Father? ☺

Hide and Seek - One Father's Story

When my son was a toddler, he loved to play the game of hide-and-seek. But one day he decided to play without telling me what he was doing. When his absence became conspicuous, I called out to him, "Where are you?" Then I searched the house thoroughly, or so I thought. I kept looking and re-looking at all his normal hiding spots, but he was nowhere to be found. After three hours, I was in a panic.

Then I spotted one place I had not checked, but it was highly unlikely I would find him there so I passed by it many times without looking. Beside the fireplace was a cabinet built into the wall, and it was filled with firewood. I decided to look anyway and did not see him at first, but having nowhere else to search, I stooped down and looked way up onto the top of the wood stacked inside—and there he was! What relief to finally find him.

When I asked if he hadn't heard my voice calling him, he said he did; he knew my voice, but he wanted to keep hiding.

This is not a new story—the same thing happened to Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden. "Then the man and his wife heard the sound of the LORD God as he was walking in the garden in the cool of the day, and they hid from the LORD God among the trees of the garden. But

the LORD God called to the man, 'Where are you?'" (Genesis 3:8-9) They did not answer because they were afraid; they had disobeyed God and did not want to face Him in their sin. Although I did not know where my son was hiding, God knew exactly where Adam and Eve were, but He called out to them to bring them out of hiding and to forgive them and restore their relationship.

God knows where you are, too. If you are trying to hide from the truth of how our disobedience displeases God, there is nowhere you can hide that God cannot find you. And we do not need to fear God—he is a God of love and desires to forgive us of our sins and restore our relationship with Him. All you need to do is to come out of hiding, confess your wrong-doings, and ask for His forgiveness in Jesus' name. Do you hear your Father's voice calling you?

Don't be afraid; approach Him in prayer and ask for His salvation. Your Father in Heaven wants you to be His child. He loves you just as you are and wants to bless you just as we fathers want to bless our children—even when they disobey. "Just as a father loves his children, So the Lord loves those who fear and worship Him" (Psalm 103:13 AMP). This Father's Day, why not get to know your Father in Heaven? He knows everything about you already and is waiting for you to answer His call. ☺

- Roman, from the Ukraine, came in all excited to see the chapel. He just started driving two months ago and this is the first time he has come to a trucker's chapel. He asked if he could take some pictures to send to his dad. I said to take as many as he would like!
- Denton, from Jamaica, stopped by while I was out on the deck. He said he is a believer, but had a lot of questions he wanted to ask me. We talked for over two hours and then we prayed. He said he would be back and thanked me for being here.
- Cary came in for prayer and was wondering if we had more chapels, so I gave him some *Highway News* magazines and showed him where they are located. He thanked me, we prayed, and he was on his way.
- Greg had some questions about spiritual matters; he was agnostic. I shared the ABC plan [from the back of the *Highway News*] and then we had prayer. He prayed to receive Jesus as his Lord and Savior!

Oh, that Burning Feeling!

You stop for a fuel break and rest. Wonderful aromas from the truck stop restaurant waft through the air. You join your friends and enjoy a delicious meal. Back on the road again, and then the burning sensation starts. You wonder...Did you eat something that upset you? Or did you eat too fast or too much?

Either one is a possibility, but actually most heartburn (if it's mild and occasional) or Gastroesophageal Reflux Disease (GERD) if it's chronic and causes other problems, is the backward flow of stomach acid into the tissues above the stomach. The muscle between the stomach and esophagus has failed to close tightly enough to prevent the backflow, and that can result from consistently eating foods that upset the digestive system, from overeating, or from eating too fast.

You are not alone in your symptoms. According to Medline, sixty percent of the adult population experiences some type of GERD within a twelve month period; thirty percent have weekly symptoms; and seven million have some symptoms of GERD.

Treatment: If it's only occasionally that you have a problem, you can easily solve it with an over-the-counter antacid like Tums. However, if you have this condition frequently, you are at the stage where serious, possibly life-threatening consequences can occur. In addition to indigestion, symptoms can include a persistent dry cough, sore throat, hoarseness, gas, difficulty swallowing, and the feeling that something is stuck in your throat. That's the time you want to see a doctor, because continuous, prolonged episodes can cause permanent damage to the digestive system. A doctor can prescribe a medication to help reduce stomach acid. Common drugs are proton pump inhibitors (reduces almost all stomach acid) and H2 receptor blockers (an antihistamine that reduces some of the stomach acid). If you do take them, make sure you use them correctly. And don't pay attention to the commercials that say if you take this or that pill you can enjoy all the foods you like to eat. While that sounds enticing, the foods are still causing a problem in your digestive track and can lead to further problems. These medications can be purchased over the counter and are fine for a short-term course of treatment, but, as with any medication, long-term use can cause other complications. That's why it's important to discuss your symptoms and their frequency with your doctor. These medications are intended

as an aid while you also work on an alternative plan to help eliminate the root cause of the problem.

Prevention: There are several things you can do to help prevent heartburn and indigestion and assure that it won't turn into GERD. These include:

- Eating smaller, more frequent meals so that the stomach is not overloaded all at once.
- Avoiding foods that cause irritation to the stomach (spicy foods, raw onions, citrus juices, coffee, alcohol, and chocolate); this can help reduce stomach acid. Watch what you eat and determine which foods cause distress.
- Avoiding high fat foods (think fast food). They are another trigger as they don't digest easily.
- Eating high fiber foods to help enhance digestion. That would include a variety of vegetables, whole grains, legumes, and nuts.
- Chewing your food well. Gulping food doesn't allow for digestion and can cause gas.

Keeping a journal of what you ate, when you ate it, and how you felt afterwards will help you determine what is causing the problems so you can avoid those items

Take time to enjoy your meal. Eating in a distracted state is like driving while distracted. Here are some tips on how to enjoy your meal (from choosemyplate.gov):

1. Get to know the foods you eat—your journal can help you make better choices.
2. Take your time—eat slowly and enjoy the taste and textures.
3. Use a smaller plate—this helps portion control and you won't overeat.
4. Choose healthier options; most restaurants have nutrition information available.
5. Satisfy your sweet tooth in a healthy way, with fresh fruit, fruit parfait with yogurt, baked apples, etc.
6. Choose to eat some foods more or less often—more often for vegetables, fruits, whole grains; less often for fatty, salty, sugary foods.
7. "Sip Smarter"—drink water or calorie-free beverages; drink milk; avoid sodas and other sweetened beverages.
8. Make treats "treats" and not everyday foods. 🍷

Faith Is Not Safe!

Recently there was a one-time showing of “Facing Darkness.” It was a movie produced by Samaritan’s Purse, telling the story of the Ebola crisis in Liberia and how they stepped in to make a difference. The commitment of all those who chose to become involved knowing the dangers was and is a lesson to all of us. It was deemed necessary to follow strict protocols as they cared for and treated the growing number of lives being decimated by the disease every day. Yet, with all the precautions taken, Dr. Kent Brantly and another medical worker became infected. Dr. Brantly was the leader of the team and after a long fight and many prayers and a miracle, he and his fellow worker recovered.

One thing stood out as I listened to his testimony. Who he is and why he did what he did was summed up in a short statement that could have easily been missed. He ended his account by saying, “faith is not safe.” How often are we admonished to simply trust God because by trusting Him we will not experience pain, suffering, difficulties, loss, and even death? Is this the promise and result of our great faith?

I am reminded of what the writer of the book of Hebrews tells us in chapter 11. We are introduced to numerous Old Testament men and women whose lives and deeds were the result of their faith. Hebrews 11:1 states that “Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see. This is what the ancients were commended for.” A few of those mentioned in that chapter are Abraham, Moses, Rahab, and Samuel. Yet there were those who were flogged, imprisoned, stoned, sawed in two (and let’s not forget the Apostle Paul, who related, in 2 Corinthians 11, all the tribulations he suffered while ministering in Jesus’ name). Of those, the writer says, “The world was not worthy of them.” Can that be said of you and me?

Our faith is no guarantee of a life without pain, suffering, or disappointment, but it guarantees a hope that is cer-

tain. Why? Because our kingdom is not of this present world. When I was in high school there were four of us young men from our youth group at church who sang in a quartet we called “The Teenaires.” One of the songs I remember us singing often was “I Am on the Battlefield for My Lord.” It is obvious that in any battle there are casualties. It’s just that none of us wish to be counted as one of them!

What is it I love most? We sing “You can have all this world, just give me Jesus,” but how deep do those words go? Does the world hold us from being sold out because the cost is too great? Am I living a sold-out life? Faith means I am all in, no matter what is ahead. There is a cost in every decision we make. There is a cost in going and there is a cost in not going. For Dr. Brantly and his team there was a cost. His going cost him his health and possibly his life. On the other hand, to not go would have cost the lives of many more people. There is always a cost.

Living out our faith doesn’t mean we will be safe, and that is becoming more and more apparent when we consider the events taking place all around us. As one of my driver friends reminds me, “Pay attention to what is not being said, not what is said.” Or, in other words, “read between the lines.” The more our conversation is focused on the news we hear every day, the more we may fail to see the faithfulness of God and the scope of what He is doing.

To follow Jesus each day is not always safe. It is not safe when our convictions may not line up with our friends’ convictions, and it becomes necessary to take a stand and sometimes that can mean standing alone. When such tiems come, remember, Faith is not safe! ☹

Burn Out or Rust Out? There *Is* an Alternative!

Hey, Green Onion,” said Bag-of-Bones Jones, “now that everything has failed in our world, I guess we have nothing left but prayer!” “I don’t know, Bones,” Green Onion replied, serious for once. “I think I detect a defeatist tone in your voice. We need to learn that if we walk in close fellowship with our Father in Heaven, worshipping and praising Him, He will give us His joy regardless of the circumstances, and then He wants to send us out to share our joy with the lost.” “I see, Onion,” Bones replied, convicted. “Thanks for setting me straight!”

Who is more miserable than a believer who has lost sight of the focus of the Christian life, and to compensate has redoubled his efforts to frantically serve God in some capacity? These misguided people’s motto is, “I’d rather burn out than rust out,” which they may have heard at a Christian conference when they were young and enthusiastic. But striving in the flesh will only wear them out. They have never learned that there is an alternative.

In an odd way, this makes me think of the brother of the prodigal son in Jesus’ parable. Remember the story? He was the sober, dutiful son who stayed home and worked hard, as he self-righteously pointed out to his father when his younger brother, after wasting his inheritance, came back home and was welcomed back.

Yes, he had faithfully stayed home working by his father’s side, and so we commend him for that, but he seems to have missed out on any real intimacy with his father. There is a real sense of resentment in his words, when the father comes outside to find out why he will not join the celebration: “All these years I’ve been slaving for you and never disobeyed your orders. Yet you never gave me even a young goat so I could celebrate with my friends.” Was that true? Consider the father’s response: “Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours!”

That reminds me of what Jesus said to His disciples (and says to us today) in John 15:13—that He no longer called

them servants, but friends. Oh, how easy it is for us to live in bitterness and resentment toward our own father, or a family member, or a church and its leaders, and even our own dear Heavenly Father, when we think that He is not “paying attention” to all our hard work! We so easily can become like the elder son and prefer just to work hard in our own strength, forgetting that Jesus calls His disciples to “be with Him” and then, filled with His Spirit, go into the world working for Him, empowered by the promise that He would never, ever, leave us or forsake us.

Before Jesus ascended into heaven after His resurrection, He told His disciples to wait and pray until they were “endued with power from on high.” Once they were empowered by the Holy Spirit, they learned never to go anywhere without this constant intimacy, communion, and conversation with God. Those who walk in this constant fellowship with the Father (and I pray that is the experience of everyone reading these words) know they can come to His throne of grace, not only in times of need, but at any time, worshipping Him in gratitude and praise for His every blessing.

That’s the company of the committed, freed to serve and minister anywhere the Lord leads them, not in their own power but in the power of the Holy Spirit.

Are you among them? If not, I encourage you to go to Him today, like the prodigal coming home to his father. Like that father, the Lord wants to receive you into His family and grant you all the privileges of sonship. ☺
