A Word from Our President

Jesus has taken the “thorns and thistles” we work among (Genesis 3:18), and He wore a crown of thorns on His head as a reminder that He is indeed the “King of kings and Lord of lords” (Revelation 19:16). The crown of thorns the Roman soldiers placed on Jesus’ head with the intent of mocking Him turned out to be a picture of Jesus’ rule and reign as the one true King.

As Jesus works to redeem all things, He has redeemed your life through faith in Him. He has delivered you from the penalty and power of sin, and through the indwelling presence of the Holy Spirit, you are empowered to redeem your work for the glory of God and the good of others. He restores to us the ability and the capacity to be the image bearers God intended us to be. However, too often when professional drivers climb those steps and enter through the door of their truck, they tend to leave their faith behind in the parking lot. This has to change and that change begins with you.

In the process of redeeming your work, here are three ways you will find God at work in you and through your work.

The first thing we learn from God's Word is that Jesus is our BOSS. Which brings up the question: How do you work for your employer? Do you work for him or her as you would work for Jesus? It's easy for our eyes of faith to become glassy at work and we forget who it is we work for. Jesus may not be your company owner. He may not be physically sitting in an office watching your every move, or the one signing your checks, but He is the one you work for. Paul had this in mind when he said, “Whatever you do, work heartily, as for the Lord and not for men... You are serving the Lord Christ” (Colossians 3:23-24).

The next time you feel frustrated, angry, or not compelled to do your job, take a moment, pray, seek God's grace in Christ and remember that it's Jesus who you're really working for.

The second thing you need to know is that God works through your work. God is at work in your life and through your life in more ways than you can imagine. Even though you may not see how the work you do benefits others, know that God has chosen to work through you, through your skills and experience, for the good of others.

Thirdly, you can trust God with your work.

Are you stressed at work? If you haven't felt this way at one point in your life, you probably haven't worked long enough. There are many causes of stress at work: crushing deadlines, conflict with your co-workers or manager, or you're not compensated well for the work you do. Regardless of what makes you feel stressed at work, in Christ you are free from anxiety. You can trust God wholeheartedly to meet your needs, to meet you in the storms of life, and to work through you despite what's going on around you.

Understand this: these three essential truths only scratch the surface of what God says about work. In the Scriptures, God's guide for our lives, we discover a number of ways our faith influences our work. In the words of the Psalmist, "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path" (Psalm 119:105).

Remember this: When you flip through the pages of the Bible, you're not going to find a verse telling you what job you should take or where you should live. What you will discover are verses about work that will provide you with direction in the decisions you make and the work you pursue; you will find what you need to know to “work heartily, as for the Lord” (Colossians 3:23).

Truckers for Freedom

“Free those who are wrongly imprisoned” (Isaiah 58:6)

Human Trafficking – also known as slavery... That’s something that’s been over and done with since the Civil War, right?

Wrong.

Today America has just as many, or even more, slaves as she did before the Civil War. And no amount of renaming those slaves as “human trafficking victims” will change that fact. Many of these slaves are used exclusively for sex—by selling their bodies, among other places, at truck stops, sometimes under the watchful eyes of a pimp or “madame.”



This tragedy means America is no longer a “free” nation. Its freedom is being undermined by the evils of slavery.

Truck drivers see more of America than most people. They are also in a position to fight against this evil and free the innocent slaves by reporting any questionable activity to the proper authorities. But why should we care to do this at all? Patriotism? Heroism?

No—it’s because God wants us to do it.

Let me explain. The Bible says that we are equal in God’s sight—that He shows no favoritism (Romans 2:11) and we should “love our neighbor as ourselves” (Leviticus 19:18, Galatians 5:14). Heat Was No Deterrent for the Work of the Holy Spirit

Chaplain Joshua has been absent from the local scene for a long time—ever since being assigned on the Zambia-Namibia route, where he is the company’s lead driver. He spends most of his time in Namibia. The picture on the right was taken recently at the Zambia-Namibian border of Katimamulilo when he was preaching to other drivers as they waited for border clearance.

This particular picture means much to him because it was taken when the circumstance surrounding the event was a new experience for him.

He and the seven drivers who appear in the picture had been at the border for six days awaiting clearance because of congestion of trucks. On this particular day it was unusually hot, much more so than in the previous days, and Joshua felt physically drained. He was forced to sit in his truck with the engine running to drive the air conditioner, even though running the engine for that purpose on a parked vehicle is normally considered a fuel waster. As he dozed off, he thought he felt a hand shaking him to wake up and a voice saying, “There are drivers that must be saved today through your preaching.” Then the hand gave him a final shake that woke him from the nap. He jerked himself up with renewed energy (or anointing), turned off the engine, and walked the parking lot inviting drivers to gather and hear him preach the Word of God. Normally he would have considered it insane to invite drivers into the scorching heat to hear him preach, as he would expect none to attend. But, to his surprise, seven drivers came, and as he preached with extraordinary boldness, they listened to him attentively as if they did not feel the heat at all. All seven drivers accepted Jesus! It was then that Chaplain Joshua realized that the hand he felt and the voice he heard in the truck when he dozed off was not just his imagination—it was real; and it was probably the same invisible hand that had sheltered him and the seven drivers from the heat!

NEWS FROM LODI, OHIO

This month we want to highlight the ministry in Lodi, Ohio, under the leadership of Chaplain Jason and Shannon Nussbaum.

In the past fifteen years of working in this area, Jason has seen a big difference in the culture of the drivers he meets. They have not been influenced by the church in general and are more and more distracted by social media and the digital world. He makes more connections with people in the truck stop than he does in the FaithLife Center.

To encourage drivers, he has started a weekly prayer meeting and Bible study. He gets so excited when this time results in a spiritual breakthrough. Jason and Shannon ask for your prayers for physical health issues that are plaguing many on his team in Lodi, as well as a spirit of unity among the associates.



The logs below are an additional glimpse of how the Lord is using the witness of the ministry in Lodi:

- ◆ A 24-year-old new driver came in. He was a bit discouraged and wanted to talk. He said he just bought a new truck and he is already having problems—it was in the shop and the part wouldn't be in until tomorrow. We talked for a while and prayed before he left.
- ◆ A driver came in on his reset. We spent the next three hours as he shared his past problem with drugs and how he came to know the Lord. It was reassuring to see his stand as a believer and to encourage him in it. I prayed for him before he left.
- ◆ A driver stopped and asked, "How do you pray to God?" I reminded him of how Jesus explained to His disciples, as He was teaching them the Lord's prayer, that we can approach Him in prayer at any time and in any position because He knows our heart. I shared how our salvation is by faith, which prompted him to ask how the people before Jesus' time could be saved. I reminded him that Abraham became our example of salvation by faith and not by works. I commented that I sensed he was interested in spiritual things, to which he responded, "I'm Muslim." I asked him also how he believed one gets into heaven, with all our sin; he said it was all good works. I reminded him that the Scripture states that even our acts of righteousness are as filthy rags before God's holiness, and without a means of them being covered God cannot let us into His presence. What an opportunity to speak the truth in love!
- ◆ A driver came in to give a donation. He has not been able to attend church because of being on the road. We talked for a while and prayed before he left.
- ◆ A driver from Iowa stopped in during the night, asking for prayer for safety during his driver training. He was witness to a ten-car pile-up and stopped to give assistance. He requested a Bible, and since I knew he spoke Spanish, I gave him a Spanish Bible, for which he was very thankful. I prayed for him, for safety on the road, health, and God's guidance about his future in trucking and using him to minister to other drivers.

Elite Service Holds Cancer Benefit Truck Show

Company Honors the Memory of Faithful Employee Jane Harting

It all started in 2015, when Elite Service's office employee Jane Harting was diagnosed with cancer. Company president Rebecca (Becky) Yoder said that Jane was like family, having been with the company for more than twenty-five years. "It all happened so fast," Becky says. "She was a special person, loved by all, and it was a shock when she passed away so suddenly, just four

months after diagnosis. The first benefit show was planned to help her and also raise her spirits; we never expected her to pass away at all, and definitely not before that first show took place."

They have kept the show going each year since then, with the purpose of raising money for other cancer patients and their families. "We didn't expect the shows to take off like they did," Becky says. "We are very thankful for everyone who supports this cause."

The day after the 2019 show (held every year in June), Becky expressed her appreciation to those who participated in the show: "Trying to express how much you all mean to us is just impossible. I have sat in silence for hours reflecting on the day and all the people who made our show a success. First of all, Jane; although she has been gone for four years, her voice, love, kindness, teachings, and sense of humor have filled our minds and our hearts ever since. As of this morning, the donation tipped over \$16,000. Through you, twenty-three families affected by cancer will be helped in some way. I intended to name everyone who helped, from those who 'nudged' us for another year, those who volunteered their time and donations, those who attended the show, the sixty-six drivers who brought their trucks, as well as those who

helped set up, clean up, collect donations, and did all the work involved; but there are too many of you to count; but none of you went unnoticed."



Elite Service, Inc. has twenty-six rigs running all lower forty-eight states and Canada, hauling mostly aluminum products for Hydro. It's a family-run company, with Becky as president and her husband, Ronald Yoder, filling the roles of driver, mechanic, driver trainer, and whatever else is needed. Becky's mother is the owner, her father is company officer, her sister is chief information officer, and her sister's husband is shop manager. Becky told me she believes one of the reasons for the success of the company is the family atmosphere.

Attending the 2019 show last summer, I was impressed with the nice variety of trucks—from brand-new to great antiques. I was especially fascinated with the CL 9000 Ford brought by David Hurlburt from Lancaster, Pennsylvania (above right). For some reason it is very rare to see one like it at antique truck shows. Then there was a beautiful brand-new KW owned by E & F Trucking and driven by husband-and-wife team Eugene and Marilyn Martin (see cover).

Next year's show will be held June 13, 2020 on the company lot at 905 Stone Hill Road, Denver, Pennsylvania (near the intersection of route 222 and exit 286 of the Pennsylvania Turnpike). Put it on your calendar and plan to join us!

I was born in Germany in 1959. I came to America when I was eight years old and didn't speak any English. My dad was in the Army, and my mom worked also. They were hardworking parents and tried hard to raise us right, even sending us to church on Sundays.

My rebellion started in high school with doing drugs and skipping school. I thought I knew best. Eventually I ran off and joined the Army. I learned more about drugs. I went to Germany and learned even more about drugs, booze, and women. I came back to the States after my three-year hitch in the Army, leaving with an honorable discharge.

I continued to use drugs and booze it up! I was looking for love and all that stuff. I had one relationship after another. At one point I met this gal named Laura and thought I loved her. We were in East St. Louis looking for drugs. A man shot her in the back, taking out the artery of her heart. While I watched her dying, he started shooting everything in sight. I got shot in the arm, my dog got shot, and my truck got shot. I never knew I could run so fast on my knees and elbows.

That was it! That was the turning point of my life. A lot of other stuff happened after that. It wasn't good stuff. But one day I stopped at a trucker's chapel in Gary, Indiana, and accepted Jesus into my life that day!

I really thought all my problems would just magically go away, but it really doesn't happen that way. For me, things got a little worse before they got better, but now I'm like a drunk walking with Jesus. If it wasn't for Him, I don't know where I would be today - probably in a grave somewhere. I am a walking testimony of God's grace and mercy, and He continues cleaning me up a little more each day. If I would just be still and listen, He could do a lot more, a lot faster. When I look back at all the things I've done, the good Lord could've just taken me out; I don't know why He didn't. All I can say is, "Thank You, Jesus, for saving the wretched man that I am. Please don't give up on me!"

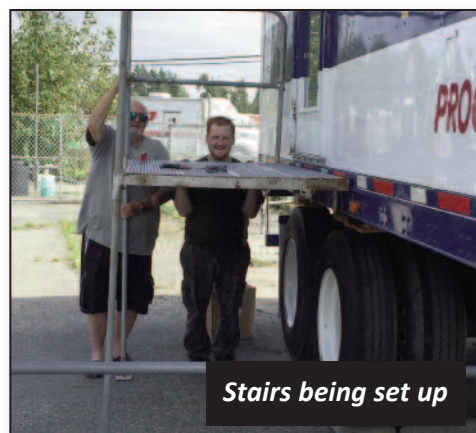
Chilliwack Chapel Is "Back Home"

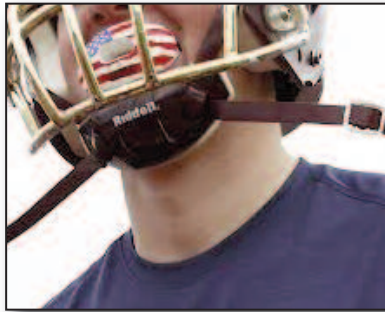

It is because the Lord loves you that He allows trials to happen. Without difficulties we would become superficial and flippant. Don't let depression or apathy dominate you. Ignore others' opinions, moods and attitudes.

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things" (Philippians 4:6-8).

Proverbs 15:13 says, "A happy heart makes the face cheerful, but heartache crushes the spirit." Those who look to Him are radiant and glow. They beam in happiness. They acknowledge their blessings. Joy is one of the fruits of the Holy Spirit.

So if you want to spoil the day of a grouch, brush your teeth and put on a smile. It will thaw ice and improve your face value. "A cheerful look brings joy to the heart, and good news gives health to the bones" (Proverbs 15:30). I've heard that "smiles" is the longest word in English—because there's a mile between the first and last letter! The Bible says, "A cheerful heart is good medicine, but a crushed spirit dries up the bones" (Proverbs 17:22).

Why has joy been the trademark of all those who have truly followed Jesus? They knew the last chapter of His Book and believed it: "No longer will there be any curse... They will see his face, and his name will be on their foreheads. There will be no more night... And they will reign for ever and ever. The angel said to me, 'These words are trustworthy and true. The Lord, the God of the spirits of the prophets, sent his angel to show his servants the things that must soon take place'" (Revelation 22:3-6).

That's why we can smile an extra mile in the storms. We know we are not alone—and we have His promise: "Behold, I am coming soon!" (Revelation 22:12). And that's why we can sing the words Thomas Ken penned in 1709: "Praise God, from whom all blessings flow; praise Him, all creatures here below; praise Him above, ye heavenly host; praise Father, Son, and Holy Ghost."

"Let everything that has breath praise the LORD" (Psalm 150:6).
