Back on the Road Again - Part 1

Conventions are back. In March I had the privilege to serve at conferences in South Carolina and Missouri. Later this month, I will be in Oklahoma. I continue to speak at online events, but there is nothing like being together with kindred spirits who love God and their families.

I am blessed to have the opportunity to connect with so many earnest parents who are seeking to

train their children to live forever. We all come to a conference with legitimate concerns about curriculum and edifying family activities, but ultimately our desire is to encourage our children to follow Jesus.

Over the years, I have been given many semi-

nar topics. Then at the end of a workshop, I am asked questions. As you might expect, I receive queries about math, raising a special needs child, family discipleship, and marriage advice. I am happy to share what insights I have learned in seeking to build a family of faith for over forty years.

Sometimes I am asked what I would do differently or what advice I have for young parents just beginning their journey of training their children to live forever. I used to answer that question by encouraging them to pray for their children, teach them God's Word in a regular family devotion time, and model His Word while you are with them. These principles are clearly taught in Scripture.

However, there is one new thing I add, and that is to invest in your own relationship with God. How I minister to my family as a father and husband flows from my connection with my Heavenly Father. I am convinced that I can only give what I have received. If I am to love God and my family well, I need to be loved well. In order for me to be a loving husband and father, I first need to be a loved son.



Jesus was equipped to be a loving, servanthearted, sacrificial Savior because He was loved beautifully by His Dad. At His baptism, the Spirit of God descended on Him and God the Father spoke to His Son's heart, saying words every son needs to hear from their dad:

"You are my dearly loved Son, who brings me great joy" (Matthew 3:17 NLT). Throughout His earthly ministry, Jesus would continue to take time alone to pray, find refreshment, and be encouraged by God.

As a follower of Jesus for over forty years, I know that the best thing I can do for my family is emulate Jesus by coming close to God, being filled with the Holy Spirit, and receiving a similar affirmation. Because of what Jesus has done for me on the cross, I am forgiven, clothed, and adopted into God's family. By grace I am a dearly loved child, who brings God great joy. And like Jesus, I continue to daily set aside time to pray, read His Word, be refreshed by His Spirit, and come into His presence.

Digital Addiction - Part 2 of 6 Rehabbing From the Culture

"Guard your heart above all else, for it determines the course of your life" (Proverbs 4:23 NLT)

It has been said that the heart is the seat of our emotions or affections. Our feelings control more of our lives than we sometimes like to admit. At one time or another, we have all given into negative emotions such as anger, frustration, etc., and made decisions we later regretted. The opposite is also true. For example, some married people have felt strong emotions of joy toward someone they shouldn't and committed adultery. God created our emotions, and He is clear that we are to guard them because they have the potential to go awry. Addiction is highly emotional. Just try taking a digital device away from a toddler or adolescent, and you will see them emote their displeasure of what they perceive to be a severe injustice. Addiction is a clear case of misplaced emotions. In contrast, would it not be better if they became a little cranky when mom or dad insist they put the Bible down and come to dinner? I seriously doubt too many have ever experienced that scenario, but I submit to you that God would love it.

If you want to know where someone's affections lie, check their movie library. You will find that most young adults and teens who attend church and Christian school have a deep affinity for the characters of Star Wars, Marvel, and DC. Scores of these people spend endless hours in front of their screens, living vicariously through superheroes. Many churches have used the concept of superheroes in their children's church and vacation Bible school curricula. They are far more emotionally attached to these fictional paladins than they are to the authentic characters of the Bible. Having a biblical worldview means that our affections are reserved for the things of God. And where are they coming to know these characters? Their screens, of course.

An even more insidious thing is happening. Many of our youth are learning alternative spiritualities. For example, George Lucas, the creator of Star Wars, revealed, "I put the Force into the movie in order to try to awaken a certain kind of spirituality in young people—more a belief in God than a belief in any particular religious system." Lucas used the Force to communicate beliefs from Buddhism and Taoism. In a biblical worldview, Jesus is exclusive. No other religions will get one to heaven.

Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to mankind by which we

must be saved (Acts 4:12).

Let's narrow down some demographics. Baby Boomers are those born between 1946-1964, Generation X 1965-1980, Millennials 1981-1996, and Generation Z 1997-2012.³

In spending time with thousands of churched young people worldwide, I have come to realize that the vast majority of them have given their hearts to the culture as opposed to Christ. I often leave schools, churches, conferences, etc., overwhelmed at what has happened to the church in such a short time, especially since technology has taken over the entire planet and political correctness has become the accepted values of the day. You may be shocked at how many don't view the world through the lens of God's revealed Word. In the US, research from Barna and Impact 360 Institute revealed that only 10% of Baby Boomers, 7% of Gen X, 6% of Millennials, and 4% of Gen Z have a Biblical worldview 4

An article by the Impact 360 Institute titled, "Only 4 percent of Gen Z have a Biblical Worldview," revealed the following: "Given the prevalence of social media and screens in our society, we are seeing an acceleration of ideas, beliefs, and practices that are out of step with what God has revealed in the Bible. Atheism is on the rise in Gen Z. Today's teens are less Christian and more confused about moral and spiritual truth than ever."5

The December 3, 2012 Our Daily Bread devotion titled "The Spirit of the Age" described this dilemma perfectly: Every age has its own thoughts, ideas, and values that influence the culture, the "spirit of the age": It is the kind of growing consensus that morally lulls us to sleep, gradually causing us to accept society's latest values. The apostle Paul called this corrupting atmosphere the "course of this world." Describing the lives of the believers at Ephesus before they encountered Christ, he said that they were "dead in trespasses and sins" and "walked according to the course of this world" (Eph. 2:1-2). This is the world's peer pressure—a satanically inspired system of values and ideas that cultivates a lifestyle that is independent of God."6

The sign he held read, HELP—NO JOB. As cars passed through the intersection where he was standing, those so inclined stopped and offered a buck or two. In the moment, they had indeed helped. When she passed through that same intersection, she saw something else. When she looked at his face, she saw hopelessness and despair. If a person's expression could speak, his said, "I just don't know what to do." From the cab of her truck, she handed him a five, but she felt like she had patronized him instead of helping him. She was making a delivery to a distribution center less than a mile from where she saw him. On this particular day, she was informed that there would be a delay of at least four hours in unloading her, because they were shorthanded. They needed loading dock help desperately.

She decided to go for a walk. She also had a thought that ultimately gave her walk a little more purpose than just some exercise. She walked back to the guy standing in the intersection. He recognized her and immediately

thanked her again for the money she had given him. "I may be able to offer you more than a five, if you're interested." He was, and they walked back toward the distribution center together. By the time it was her turn to unload, he was standing on the dock, wearing a new pair of gloves and a smile.

When her truck was unloaded, he came up beside her rig and tapped on her door. Holding up the five that she had given him earlier in the day he said, "Here, this is yours; I don't need it anymore. Thank you very much!" She told him to keep it and pass it on to someone who needed it. He smiled and said he would.

Empowering others to do for themselves can be an act of kindness and compassion that keeps on giving!


TruckersLife Foundation - Reaching Out to Drivers in Need

Trucking with Women in Mind

What I Learned from My Wearable

I never thought I could be friends with a piece of technology that is exceptionally nosey. I'm a pretty private person, and the thought of sharing my physical data makes me pretty uncomfortable. Sharing my sleeping patterns, my eating habits, and how often my heart rate was elevated isn't my idea of privacy. However, we recently partnered with Rolling Strong to do a wellness competition, and I donned a Fitbit Versa for the challenge.

I had participated in a competition in the past and discovered that I could get more points if I had a "wearable" instead of entering everything into the app myself. Knowing that my little Fitbit was going to tattle on me for a few weeks made me anxious. To be honest, I wasn't sure I wanted other people to be able to check on my progress. The Fitbit recorded everything from my steps each day to my heartbeat to how many hours (and minutes) I slept each night.

Every participant was assigned a coach to guide us through the process, and I was fortunate to be paired with Claudia. We'd talk about what I was eating and how much water I was drinking each day, as well as the type of exercise and extent I was burning calories.

I'm a pretty healthy person. I walk four miles a day (when I'm not traveling), and I don't eat red meat or things like butter. I love salads, and I could eat peas for lunch every day. I can flip off a cupcake or piece of cake easily, as I'm not into eating sweets. (Okay, don't give me any chips or pretzels, as I'm into the salty stuff.) I thought I could beat everyone entered into the competition, and I set my sights on Lana, our Director of Programs. She has three little kids and runs around all the time, and I knew this would be a challenge. (She hit 20,000 steps one day when they were moving from one house to another! NO FAIR!!!!)

I was diligent, and I knew that Claudia was keeping track of my sleep, my steps, my carbs, and my heart rate. I entered my healthy meals and my water intake (oh, did I forget to log those glasses of wine?). I kept thinking about the end of the competition and how I could go back to "normal."

At the end of the competition, Claudia asked me what I had learned. I'd like to share this with you, my readers. I learned a lot about myself. I challenge you to get a "wear-

able" and get to know yourself a little better. First, since I usually am traveling over 125,000 miles each year and spend weeks attending conferences and trade shows, this has been a different experience for me. I don't usually get to sleep in my own bed for more than a few days at a time, so this was a good time to participate in the Rolling Strong competition. I typically spend many nights in hotel rooms.

The pandemic kept me at home but allowed me to find a routine. I went to bed each night at a pretty consistent time and woke up without an alarm shaking me from my sleep to give a presentation. I learned that I need a lot of sleep. No, really, a LOT of sleep. I'm not even sure if I should admit it, but I sleep for nine to eleven hours a night. When I was a baby, my mom would put me down after lunch, and I'd sleep until the next morning. She complained to the doctor, and he asked her what the problem was?! So, I learned that I sleep a lot.

I also learned that I don't drink enough water. I started marking all my water bottles with the ounces on them. My favorite bottle held 38 ounces. But this wasn't enough for Claudia. No, she challenged me to drink over 80 ounces a day. Wait, you want me to walk four miles AND drink all that water? I can't imagine how professional drivers handle this challenge.

The key to winning the Rolling Strong competition is to elevate your heart rate. Since I sit at my desk most of the day, that's a real challenge. I tried to hit my 10,000 steps a day, although the Fitbit wanted me to accumulate 30,000 steps a day (really?).

When the competition ended, I sighed in relief, but I also knew that I had changed my attitude toward fitness. Sleeping is good, lots of water is good, and getting those steps in each day is good. I'll keep that in mind, even though I won't have Claudia checking on me until the next competition. I think I'll start asking myself WWCD (What would Claudia Do?).

And just for the record, I beat Lana, but just barely. I came in 18th, and she was right behind me at 19th. We both won, and now I need to get ready for bed after my glass of water. I need my ten hours of sleep!

Passing By No Longer

One of the alarming stats you are likely to hear in regards to sex trafficking is that "within 48 hours of running away from home a teen will be approached by a pimp or trafficker." Whereas there is some appropriate skepticism around the validity of this stat, what is not debated is that homeless youth are in danger, to a significant degree, of being targeted and exploited into sex trafficking. What this means on a practical level is that there are people in the world (whom we call a pimp or trafficker or

a pedophile) who actively look to identify young, vulnerable youth in our midst, for the purpose of exploiting them. And this does not happen in the dark corners of the world, it happens right before our eyes.

When I was a youth pastor there was a day our team decided to do a "homeless simulation" in the city to see how people respond to

homelessness. The youth made signs saying "homeless, please help" and then our team went into the city to begin the simulation.

Within 20 minutes of our arrival two things happened that deeply troubled our group. The first was that hundreds, if not thousands, of people passed by our youth without giving a second thought to their predicament—they were either ignored or given un-empathetic looks and gestures. A few people even shouted derogatory remarks towards them from their cars. The second thing that happened completely caught our group off-guard: two of our youth, in two different parts of the city, were solicited for sex by an adult man. This brought the simulation to an abrupt end, and we quickly gathered our team at the church building to reflect on the experience.

What we concluded is that oftentimes vulnerable young people in our midst go largely unnoticed by a busy society, while at the same time being specifically targeted by others with bad intentions. We realized that both responses were intertwined. If just one of the hundreds of people passing by were equipped to see the signs and to intervene in a positive way, then the likelihood of vulnerable youth being exploited by others would greatly diminish. Therefore we resolved to no longer be "people

passing by."



Now imagine if there were thousands of people trained and equipped, not just in one city, but in cities across the United States. That is what Gateway to Freedom Foundation (GTFF) is doing. We are training chaplains, truck drivers and concerned citizens to identify the signs of vulnerable people in our midst

and how to intervene in safe and effective ways. Through our training, we make it possible for chaplains, drivers and concerned citizens to connect with vulnerable youth before a pimp or trafficker does. At the same time we are also equipping our chaplains to minister to people struggling with consumer sexual beliefs and behaviors by connecting them to resources that lead to freedom. This means there will be less people in the world looking to exploit vulnerable youth. Our work is making a difference.

"Thank God I found Him. It has been Jesus who loved me all these years." - Robin

When I arrived at the FaithLife Center that Monday morning, a young lady was sitting inside, waiting. I introduced myself and she said, "I'm Robin from Wyoming." I asked, "What brought you from Wyoming to Illinois?" She replied, "I was riding with a friend and when I came back from the restroom, I found that he had left me. I have been stranded here for the last two days." I learned that she was raised on a reservation in Wyoming and had suffered a life of sexual assaults by family members since she was eight years old. She was full of anger and hated men. As a result, she lived a reckless, abusive life in bondage to alcohol and drugs—which marred her reasonable thinking. I got her something to eat and spent the whole afternoon sharing the Word of God with her. She came back for the Monday evening service, with three drivers in attendance. Each driver and myself shared about the life-changing power of Jesus Christ in our lives and that He desired to save her and set her free. Robin admitted that she came in with a knife and a heart filled with hatred for the man who abandoned her here at the truck stop. She wanted to kill him. Robin said, "I don't want this hatred to rule my life any longer. I have failed as a mother of six children as I tried to find someone to love me for who I am."

Robin repented and asked Jesus to save her and guide her through her new life. We were able to get a bus ticket for the next day's journey toward home. Before she left I spent two hours with her, studying the Word of God as we went through TFC Global's *First Steps* Bible Study. I believe Robin dropped the bondages of her old life and left the FaithLife Center as a new creature in Christ. Thank you, Jesus for Your redeeming love!


