A WORD FROM OUR PRESIDENT

As the President and CEO of a Christian non-profit, a leader in a Christian men's ministry and a counselor, one of the issues that pops up most often with Christian men is the feeling of discontentment. Often they ask. "How can we, as believers, lead our families when we feel like such failures?"

Often in life, the idea of contentment seems more like a fleeting sense of renewal derived from our surroundings in brief instances. However, true contentment can only exist completely divorced from your circumstances. Contentment based on the world, seemingly at peace around you, is not true contentment, it is only situational happiness.



So what is the secret to true contentment? Well, let me start with what it is not. It is not stringing together a multitude of brief highs created by situational happiness. You can trick yourself into thinking you've found true joy...until your money runs out. You can reupholster the furniture. You can reface the cabinets. You can have a complete makeover. You can buy new cars, boats, bikes, and houses. You can change jobs, immerse yourself in non-profit work, or take the band on tour. But sooner or later, either the money runs out, or your tricks stop working. It's just you, the mirror, and the hollowness left inside.

Making yourself rich will not bring contentment. Neither will making yourself poor. Accumulating every electronic made by Apple will not bring you contentment, but neither will shunning tangible goods.

The reason is simple, really. Contentment is not tied to having much or having little. It is not tied to a particular career or a particular lifestyle. It is not tied to your health. It is not tied to your spouse. It is not tied to your children. In fact, it has nothing to do with you!

In the journey of learning contentment, your biggest obstacle, your fiercest enemy, your weakest link is yourself. The more you focus on you, your needs, your feelings, your happiness...the further you will walk away from being content. Seems counterintuitive, right? Well, maybe that's why it seems so elusive.

Paul says, "...for I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances. I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or in want."

Contentment is inextricably tied to your perspective, both your perspective of God and your perspective of the world. The only way to experience contentment that can last is to stop focusing on where you are and shift your perspective to focus on who God is and on life in light of His truth. Through that process you begin to focus more on others around you. As this shift occurs, God will begin to use you to see, feel, and meet the needs of the people around you, You will find yourself less and less concerned with...well...you. Ask yourself why so many families trade time around a brightly lit tree on Christmas morning to help serve meals at the local mission.

When you have totally lost yourself, you may finally find yourself and contentment.

"But what things were gain to me, those I counted loss for Christ. I count all things but loss for the excellency of the knowledge of Christ Jesus, my Lord; for whom I have suffered the loss of all things, and I do count them but refuse, that I may win Christ." Phil. 3:7-8

This Christmas season may be a good time to start learning contentment. It'll take a while, but I am confident that it is a journey worth taking. Not sure how? Here is what I consider a great (and necessary) first step:

The Bible tells us, "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

As a good friend said, "The peace is not the result of the answer; it is the result of the prayer."

Thelma and Louise is a road trip movie about two women. Thelma is a meek housewife who teams up with independent Louise to go on a fishing trip. But as their road trip ensues, there are many twists and turns, resulting in life changing experiences, especially for Thelma. Meek no more, she realizes her strength and says the quote above.

This quote is exactly what happened to me when I discovered the world of trucking over three decades ago. On hot summer nights when I couldn't sleep I would lay in the dark and tune in a trucker radio station. I listened to tales from the road. It was during those dark, wee hours that I began to learn the importance of trucking. The more I listened the more my innards ached with a passion I still cannot describe. It was a yearning to be part of that nighttime world. I believed I could successfully squelch the feeling, but soon I found myself visiting the local truck stop spending hours talking to drivers, learning the jargon, the industry, the good, the bad and the ugly, until it was no longer possible for me to ignore the notion of joining them. The trucker's world was real, not just late night radio. I realized I couldn't keep doing what I was doing, 'something crossed over in me and I can't go back' as Thelma said - so I got my CDL in 1985.

I found that trucking fired up my adrenaline, like a high. To this day it still is a rush to me. I always feel protected walking between the enormous trailers, love the smell of a diesel cranking up and hearing the singing wheels. Sometimes when I speak about my trucking experiences, I get choked up because it was such a great dream God gave me and He and I were able to make it happen. It sure wasn't easy. I was tested many times, but worth every minute? Yes.

Once I was living between the doors and working the road, I felt an odd detachment when I would return home to my 'normal' environment. Author Susan Grafton describes what I felt perfectly in one of her books about a private investigator having a similar feeling upon returning home from an especially euphoric on the job adventure:

"What I had done had fractured my perception. I'd become disassociated from a normal reality and connected to something so intensely fulfilling that I could barely put it into words. So now the 'normal' life seemed flat and strangely lusterless. Cops, rock stars and soldiers all experience this same shift – the plunge from soaring indomitability to unconquerable exhaustion doing something they love. And that is why they hang out with others of this type. Who else could understand the high but those who have experienced the same thing? You get amped and wired on situational stimulants. Afterward you have to talk yourself down until the 'charge' is off and events and your life collapse back to their ordinary size."

Living on the road forced me to be in the moment since driving an 18 wheeler takes all of your attention. I didn't mind crawling under the trailer to slide rear axles forward at the scale in Virginia, doing engine repair on the side of the road in the dark by flashlight when hauling steel coils out of Chicago or setting up the side kit for a load of watermelons on a hot Florida day. As Bill drove one night I crawled back into the sleeper. The next thing I remember was waking up to a gorgeous sunny day in some rest area somewhere at some time, as we had travelled all night. I had no idea what state we were in, what road we were on, the actual time of day - it was as if I had been dropped from another planet and no one knew who I was or where I was. What a freeing moment! As I sipped my vending machine coffee standing in front of the old KW I thought *"I wouldn't want to be anywhere else doing anything else with anyone else."* How many of you have ever had the good fortune to say this? This is when I realized for the first time in my life, *the moment was perfect in itself.*

We are all explorers in this life. Stepping out in faith and following God's nudging can lead you to some mighty experiences and in my case, an adventure of a lifetime. Missionary William Borden gave up a world of wealth to go into mission work. His famous quote about his decision was:

NO RESERVES. NO RETREATS. NO REGRETS.

Remember if you don't go you don't know. So when you go, go all in. Believe me it's worth every minute.

THE WORK OF FAITH

I hope you recently enjoyed a blessed Labor Day weekend and are experiencing a wonderful beginning to the new school year. As I pondered on this idea of labor, I thought of our labor for the Lord. We are each engaged in two kinds of labor, which I will address in this article: our work in our family (part 1) and our labor for God (part 2).

The Work of Family

I recently received an email message from my friend Dr. Brian Ray of the National Home Education Resource Institute, or NHERI for short. He conservatively estimates the number of homeschooled students in 2021 to be 3,721,000. This is up from 2,650,000 in 2020.

This increase is not surprising in the present climate in which we live. From speaking around the country this past year, I have observed that there are many reasons why people choose to train and teach their children at home. A dear friend of mine told me that his motivation for home education was similar to Noah's, who by faith "built a large boat to save his family from the flood. He obeyed God, Who warned him about things that had never happened before." (Hebrews 11:7 NLT)

Like Noah, my friend was concerned about what was coming upon the world, and in faith, he brought his children home. It was not a lack of faith on his part, but a conviction born of faith. Perhaps the same Spirit that motivated Noah has motivated you in these difficult times.

Regardless of your motivation or your choice of schooling, I congratulate you parents who are making significant sacrifices to raise your family. I hope that you know that your labors are not vain in the LORD and will bear good fruit. "Therefore, my beloved brothers, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain." (1 Corinthians 15:58)

"The righteous shall live by his faith." (Habakkuk 2:4) This expression is used three more times in the New Testament. We are called to live based on our convictions. These convictions are not easy to explain to an unbelieving world, for faith is "the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." (Hebrews 11:1) Paul similarly explains the importance of living in light of what we do not see with our eyes. "Hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what he sees? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience." (Romans 8:24-25)

You have made your decision to raise your children to live forever if they put their faith in Christ alone. That is a work of faith. It is living by faith in the light of eternity. Kudos to you, and may you remain steadfast and immovable in your resolve.

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SOLITUDE BECOMES EVERY TRUCK DRIVER'S HEAVEN OR HELL

The solitude you'll endure as a truck driver is one of the toughest challenges that new drivers face early on in their career. Everyone expects the obvious challenges a truck driver must learn to conquer - things like difficult backing situations, heavy traffic, terrible weather, tight schedules, and erratic sleep patterns. And those first solo months on the road are filled with plenty of hard lessons learned.

But people don't walk away from trucking because they can't get enough sleep or they can't figure out how to back into tight places. One of the most common reasons people walk away from trucking is the relentless solitude; the isolation from their home, their family, and their friends. And if that isn't bad enough, the most heartbreaking part may be that it doesn't necessarily end when you get home. Sometimes the isolation you experience after returning home from the road is the part you'll find to be the most unbearable of all.

SEPARATED FROM THE EVERYDAY WORLD

Truck drivers pretty much live in their own little world. It's this mini universe of truck stops, warehouses, rest areas, and Walmart parking lots. A world where all of the conversations are with strangers, and the only people that seem to exist are other drivers, waitresses, dock workers, and mechanics. And believe it or not, you'll normally spend at least 20 out of every 24 hours completely alone in your truck. It's just you with your hands on the steering wheel or your head on the pillow.

When I used to get home it would seem almost surreal to get a chance to head over to the mall to see a movie or stop by a friend's house for a visit. It was like a return to the "real world" where everyday people do everyday things. And suddenly, for a few fleeting days, I would be part of it all again. You finally get to forget about low bridges and weigh stations and tight schedules for one precious weekend and relax with your family and friends. I was always so incredibly excited! I couldn't wait to tell everyone all of the great stories about my incredible adventures.

BUT LIFE GOES ON WITHOUT YOU

Early in my career I realized that my return wasn't going to be the homecoming parade I had expected. The "Return Of The King!" The celebration of the hero who conquered the nation's highways and brought goods to his fellow man! Instead it became one of the loneliest and most difficult times of all. I realized right away that being an over the road truck driver didn't just mean a whole new life of beautiful scenery and fascinating adventures. It also meant leaving behind the life I once knew.

We all live in our own little world to some extent. We have our jobs, our homes, our everyday conversations. And most importantly, we have those people we count on every day for their love, friendship, and support. Unfortunately, that everyday world doesn't normally extend to people we only see a few days a month. As an over the road truck driver, you become an outsider in the world you once knew. Your family and friends are now busy doing everyday things that don't involve you anymore. Your kids have baseball games, play rehearsals, and high school dances you won't be there to see. Your spouse has chores to finish, children to look after, and bills to pay that you won't be there to help out with. Your old friends now have new jobs, new hobbies, and new friends that you won't be there to share.

GATEWAY TOFREEDOM

BREAKING DOWN BARRIERS TO FREEDOM (PART 2)

I was recently on a call with a chaplain who said a man contacted him and was looking for help with his pornography addiction. The man said that he had been secretly struggling with this for years and was desperate to find some help. Our chaplain talked with him more and found out that the man attended a local church in the area. Our chaplain asked the man if he had talked with his pastor about this issue and the man replied, "No. I could never bring this up to my pastor." Unfortunately this man's experience is not uncommon.

A recent study found that over one-third of active users of consumer sex strongly wished they could stop. Just like this man who contacted our chaplain, many men feel trapped in consumer sexual behavior they know is costing them everything they care about. So why don't these men seek help? What prevents them from actively pursuing freedom? In one word: **Shame**. Of all the barriers that prevent people from getting free from consumer sex, shame is the most common and formidable. It's *shame* that tells people "you can never let anyone know about this, especially people that are close to you." It's *shame* that makes people feel that something is fundamentally wrong with them and begin to believe they can never change. It's *shame* that makes people feel trapped.



This begs the question, "How does the barrier of shame, which prevents so many men from getting free, get created in the first place?" It might surprise you to know that it happens quite organically. Take my experience as an example. I can still remember the first time I was exposed to pornography. I was 11 years old and one of my friends found a playboy magazine in the woods. I remember looking at the images in the magazine and feeling two things at the same time; a little bit of pleasure and a whole lot of shame. At that point in my life no one had ever talked to me about pornography. I had no reference for it to know whether it was good or bad. No one taught me to feel shame or pushed shame on me for looking at pornography. Shame was simply built into the experience.

Little did I know but shame would grow in me the more I was exposed to pornography. It wasn't too long before I was saying things like "I can never let anyone know about what I've seen." And not long after that I began to deeply wonder "what is wrong with me? Why can't I stop this behavior?"

What appears to be true for most users is that consumer sex and shame have a symbiotic relationship. The behavior produces shame and feeds off of it at the same time. The result is people feeling trapped and trying with all their might to hide the behavior, all the while wishing to be set free.

The good news is that shame, while real and formidable is not an impenetrable barrier. Shame can be overcome by speaking the truth. On a practical level what that looks like is coming to the realization and saying to yourself, "I am not trapped or stuck." "Nothing is wrong with me." "I can and will get free from this behavior." Once you begin to deal with the shame connected to the behavior, you will be more ready to put in the hard work to get free. Trucking with Women in Mind

LeadHER Trucking: Empowering Success Behind the Wheel

Oprah Winfrey once said, "A mentor is someone who allows you to see the hope inside yourself." We know that mentors are important to each of us in advancing our careers and finding the hope inside ourselves. The Women In

Trucking Association (WIT) is offering a program focused on matching female drivers who are new to the industry, with women who have been behind the wheel for years. In an effort to understand the needs of female commercial drivers WIT partnered with Sawgrass Logistics to conduct research identifying their challenges. One of the questions involved their driver training and whether they were offered a mentor or not. Unfortunately, 84 percent said they had not been given the option to work with a mentor. Those drivers who were provided with a mentor reported that twelve percent were matched with a male mentor and only three percent were given a female mentor.

It's no wonder the turnover rate hovers around ninety percent in the trucking industry. When a driver completes her training, she has so many questions about choosing a carrier, staying in touch with her family, or tips for financial and personal health. Where can she turn for answers? Now, there is a place for recent female commercial drivers to get the advice and wisdom they are looking for. The Women In Trucking Association has partnered with the LeadHER Alliance to launch a ten-month program beginning this month. Female drivers who are new to the industry will be paired with a more seasoned driver who is willing to take the time and effort to share her expertise, knowledge and skills with her mentee. The program fees are covered by WIT, so there is no cost to the participants.

Each month the women will work with their matched partner in one-on-one meetings as well as with the entire group through an online gathering. There will be a presentation by an expert who will cover various subjects each session. The topics will range from how to choose the best carrier, how to stay healthy on the road and so much more.

The program is called, **LeadHER Trucking** and the facilitation will be done by Sarah Hilton, Program Director of the LeadHER Alliance, an organization formed to empower women in various professions, trades and community leaders. The LeadHER Alliance team is experienced in working with women in their female mentorship programs. Cynthia O'Neill, Founder, calls the process, "transformative."

While the first set of mentors and mentees will begin the program now, there will be future groups of matches in the future. The goal is to obtain sponsors willing to fund the ten-month programs so more women can secure the advice and wisdom of the women who have greater experience as professional drivers.

The Women In Trucking Scholarship Foundation invited many of their new or recent driver training students to participate in the program. The truck driver training associations are also in support of this initiative and will encourage their students to become involved.

Shirley Gray, who started out in 1991 as a company driver and then moved on to leased operator, owner operator, and independent contractor, has signed up as a mentor. Her goal is to "give back" to others and help them become successful drivers and potential future owner operators! Women in the industry are still a minority and the LeadHER Trucking Alliance will help us elevate their experiences as we attract them into transportation careers.
