




### A WORD FROM OUR PRESIDENT

### Free & Guaranteed

When I was 15 years-old I tried to spend as much time as possible at the golf course. I played golf with a lot of older men that shared their wisdom with me. I distinctly remember one man telling me to beware of two words: "free" and "guaranteed." He told me: "Christopher, remember these two things in life: One, nothing in life is free. Two, nothing in life is guaranteed."

He continued on and said that when you hear someone say that something is "free" there will always be a price to pay later on. There might be a request for your contact information, time involved in order to get the free thing or the free thing might only be part of what you want, so you have to pay for the other half.

He also explained that if something is guaranteed there's usually a catch. Often a guarantee is only good for a limited time, or you have to have the receipt, or the guarantee could be voided based on specific conditions.

That advice came to my mind as I read Paul's introduction to his letter to the believers in the city of Corinth, "I thank my God always concerning you for the grace of God which was given you in Christ Jesus, that in everything you were enriched in Him, in all speech and all knowledge, even as the testimony concerning Christ was confirmed in you, so that you are not lacking in any gift, awaiting eagerly the revelation of our Lord Jesus Christ, who will also confirm you to the end, blameless in the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. God is faithful, through whom you were called into fellowship with His Son, Jesus Christ our Lord" (1 Corinthians 1:4-9, NASB).

In Paul's introduction he starts with his expression of thanks. He gives thanks because God's gift of salvation had been given to these believers in Corinth. "the grace of God was given to you in Christ" (1 Cor 1:4b). This was a guarantee for them, "our Lord Jesus Christ, who will also confirm you to the end" (1 Cor 7:7b-8a). Notice that word "confirm" that Paul uses. It means guarantee. Paul told the Corinthians that they had God's guarantee that they would be in Christ's presence at His future return to the earth. The reason for this guarantee is stated in the next verse, "God is faithful" (1 Cor 1:9a).

That man I was playing golf with gave me good advice. Nothing is free and there are no guarantees. With one exception: when we place our faith in God for salvation it is a free gift offered to us. "The free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 6:23b). This free gift of eternal life guarantees our place in heaven forever (Romans 8:31-39). We know that God is faithful. His offer of salvation is free and it's guaranteed.

# MINISTRY HIGHLIGHTS & GIVING OPPORTUNITIES



In his latest ministry report, Dr. Norbert Mbwiliza continues to reach Tanzania, East Africa and Central Africa with the gospel, especially focusing on the truck drivers and their families. A big problem is always the lack of Bibles and getting transportation for volunteers to reach the different regions. The new organization of TFC Global Tanzania brings with it many requirements that need adjustment for ministry leaders.

There are 12 provinces in Tanzania, all of which now have a ministry coordinator. These people walk long distances on foot in hot and rainy weather. It is the desire of the office to provide some food money for these people so that they can be taken care of well. Keep praying for strength and safety for this precious team and ask God how you can give to support their needs.

The following information was shared with us:

One hundred fifty-eight drivers were reached in the regions of Tanzania, and 32 of those drivers committed their lives to Jesus Christ as their Savior.

In other areas, the drivers didn't believe that someone like this organization, TFC Global Tanzania, would care about them when no one else does.

Ninety-five drivers were reached and 19 became believers in Jesus Christ.

With the office of TFC Global Tanzania starting, they are in need of some furniture, paper/stationary plus some laptops. There is also a monthly rental fee for having an office. 
The board of directors met as a team to cast vision for 2023. Some of their goals include the following:

- 1. Reaching 35,000 truck drivers with the gospel
- 2. Recruit 14 district coordinators for the different areas in Malawi
- 3. Those coordinators would recruit a total of 3.000 trained team members
- 4. Start a tailoring school for the wives of truck drivers to learn a trade
- 5. Develop a partnership with a local printing and publishing company to produce materials

The latest report from Francis Chipukunya has his team distributing a lot of Bibles and printed materials that share the gospel in English and Portuguese. They have also conducted 2 training sessions using the TFC Global program and curriculum that has been adapted for Africa. ### TRAINING CHAPLAINS

It is always better to be prepared for a situation before it happens. The situations TFC Global chaplains face on a daily basis vary greatly. You never know what will happen from day to day. Since TFC Global chaplains serve in trucking companies, FaithLife Centers at truck stops, and in a variety of other settings, circumstances can vary

greatly. We need to be prepared for being at the scene of an accident, hospital visits, providing resources to people in need, counseling for a wide variety of life issues and ready to serve at a moment's notice.

This is why TFC Global chaplains are required to be trained for service. TFC Global provides training backed by Chaplains International. Chaplains International is a nationally known and recognized chaplains training agency. Every TFC Global chaplain takes the 20 hour intensive CTI (Chaplains Training Institute) over the course of three days as well as monthly meetings and other training options throughout the year. Training is always being pursued.

Training topics for the training vary from emergency situations and protocols, confidentiality and ethics, dealing with suicide, death notifications, biblically-based

counseling, the biblical process of change, trauma and stress reactions in children, grief and healing conversations. This training is extensive and very beneficial right away. In 2021 we trained 3 men for chaplaincy services; in October 2022, we trained five men. One of these men are not serving with TFC but wanted to take the training as they pursue what God is directing them to do. Training is open to anyone, even if they are not going to serve with TFC Global.


TFC Global also has chaplain associates who volunteer their time to serve under a staff chaplain. These associates receive training from the staff chaplain or with me in my role as VP of US Operations.





However, there is also an ever present dark side to loneliness as well; addiction.

In recovery programs it's commonly understood that any type of addictive behavior feeds off of loneliness. A good friend of mine, Dan Wobschall, often says, "the opposite of addiction is not sobriety, its community." Dan has been helping men break free from pornography or other unwanted sexual behavior for over 6 years. He knows from experience.

So one of the best practices to fight addictive behavior, like pornography, is community. That is why the Gateway to Freedom Foundation invites people battling pornography or other unwanted sexual behavior into community. And let me tell you there are few things more exciting. There is a brotherhood that forms in recovery that is so powerful and life giving. Men that join the brotherhood find that the community is a lot bigger than they thought. More welcoming too.

The last Gateway to Freedom 3-day workshop I attended was so powerful because of the bond that was formed

among us men. And that bond didn't end after the 3-days was over. We have each other's back.

### **Never A Straight Line**

Calling myself a bougie girl got a laugh out of Nate and Janene when we sat down with them for the interview at the steakhouse. But as I said earlier, my bougieness was about to be put to the test when it came time to join Matt in his truck upon the completion of his training. God was about to do a work on me in that area. And it's a good thing I spent that time in deep dive prayer while Matt was on the road with his trainers. As expected, Matt picked up the skills needed for his new job in no time. Without my prayer time, I don't know if I would have been prepared for what was to come in such a short period of time. Let me give you a little background so you may understand more why this life was such a radical change for me. Not to sound like a snob, but I had seen the finer side of life and I rather enjoyed that time. The quote attributed to Sophie Tucker, among others resonated with me: "I've been rich and I've been poor. Rich is better." Sophie Tucker was a popular entertainer during the first half of the twentieth century who was known as "The Last of the Red-Hot Mamas."

I wasn't rich before, or I wouldn't be calling myself a bougie girl. Bougie, as the word is usually applied, means someone who aspires to be a higher class than they are. The term comes from bourgeois, the word used by communists to describe despised middle- or upper-class people. That was me – a middle class country girl from a family in the American heartland. Of course, my family life wasn't always as nice as it appeared on the outside. But my background provided the fertile ground in which God would plant an entrepreneurial spirit in me from an early age. I'm very grateful for that. So, I wasn't rich, but I did want to achieve all that God had for me. And I didn't consider myself a red-hot mama, either. I just liked to dress for success. During my career as a hairstylist, I would fly off to New York City with the jetsetters to attend elite atelier workshops and stay at the best hotels the Big Apple had to offer. That was me - the bougie girl.

Our new accommodations were not going to be anything like the best of the Big Apple, but we would nevertheless be riding in style on the road. After all, the truck King Bros. provided for us was a brand-new top-of-the-line Peterbilt 389 painted crimson red – just like in the vision God had given me. That's a trucker's dream, and here we were going to be able to drive that beauty right out of the gate. Or so I thought. God had other plans and needed to do a little work to prepare me for The Radical Road journey.

Even though I had been busy with preparation for our first trip and the road ahead as well as all the catching up with my family, I had missed Matt immensely. And I knew he missed me. We are best friends and go everywhere together. King Bros. had a load to Idaho lined up for us. But the truck we would come to know and love and call Crimson Creed was not ready yet. Instead of that beautiful 2023 Peterbilt we would make the trip in Big Blue.

God was about to wring out the last bit of pride from this bougie girl like He was cleaning a dirty old washcloth to prepare me for the journey. The fact that Matt and I are very close to one another took on a whole new meaning when we tried to sleep cheek to jowl in the sleeper in Big Blue. Nate said he would pay for us to stay in a motel each night of the week-long trip to Idaho and back. But he had been so kind in providing the new truck for us and in supporting our ministry in any other way he could that we didn't want him to have to pay the extra expense. But after a few sleepless nights packed like sardines in that tin can sleeper we felt we had to stay at motels for the rest of the trip. It was a safety issue. Matt had to get some sleep to drive safely on those crazy roads we had to travel. Not to mention I needed sleep as well to help put together the pieces for The Radical Road. There was a podcast to start, a website in development, and merchandise being created to help support our ministry.

The motels available for us to stay in were not much of a step up from our accommodations in Big Blue. Choices are limited for truck drivers due the size of their rigs. Matt and I both came from places where we had much and were brought low to experience firsthand the struggles people face regardless of which rung they are currently on in the ladder of life.

Did I mention God had other plans? I had the opportunity to experience with Matt some of the challenges faced by truckers every day. I especially, needed more refining to prepare me for whatever was ahead on The Radical Road. We had taken this little detour for a reason.

After all, life is never a straight line.

### MINISTRY HIGHLIGHT



Rebecca Jowers, president and executive director of the Poiema Foundation first learned about the injustice of human trafficking as a graduate student at Dallas Theological Seminary. After that initial exposure, she began to extensively research the problem and was alarmed to discover it was happening in her small community, a suburb east of Dallas. As a mother of four daughters and a survivor of sexual abuse, her heart was broken for trafficked children who have no voice. Being a former educator, she began teaching Human Trafficking 101 to anyone who would listen. It was not long before people began reaching out requesting help for victims who were rescued. Local resources were not available.

Following much prayer, pastoral counseling, and support from her family, Poiema, a faith-based organization, was founded with the vision of opening a long-term, trauma-informed residential program. Shortly after sharing her vision, a home, fully paid for and fully furnished was donated. Humble beginnings have led to great opportunities through faith and provision.

The name, Poiema, is the Greek word that means "handiwork." Ephesians 2:10 says, "We are God's handiwork (poiema) created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do." Their vision is a world where sexual abuse and exploitation are not tolerated. We also envision a world where the sexually abused are restored to be all that God created them to be as His "poiema."

The foundation has three core initiatives:

- 1. Educating the public about the dangers of human trafficking. Staff and volunteers taught at universities, healtcare facilties, churches, and other locations.
- 2. Engaging communities to help identify trafficking victims within their community. Efforts reach beyond the Dallas area to other Texas cities and South Carolina. They work with a Poster Outreach event that spreads posters of missing minors to hotel attendees, gas stations and truck stops. Over 300 children have been rescued through this event.
- 3. Empower survivors through the Poiema Safe House. This is a place where victims can recover and get the help they need.

# SIX CHARACTERICS OF MENTAL TOUGHNESS

Building mentally tough teams requires mentally tough employees. In Caliper's latest whitepaper, the Women in Trucking research team defines the psychological advantage of six essential personality traits that make up mental toughness. And while some people are more naturally inclined to possess these traits, mental toughness is also a skill that can be developed by honing in on these key characteristics and building upon them over time. Sharpening your team's skill sets can improve their performance and outcomes in the workplace, so let's dig into the six personality traits associated with mental toughness. We'll use our research to show you how to spot mental toughness in your employees and how to further develop these traits on your team.

#### 1. Level-headedness

"A measure of emotional expressivity, [level-headedness] relates to the tendency to effectively manage the expression of one's emotions. Individuals who manifest higher levels tend to remain composed in a variety of stress-inducing situations. Those who score lower tend to react more emotionally." You know the saying "cool heads prevail?" When it comes to high-performing teams, it's true. The employees on your teams must possess level-headedness to ensure the long-term success of the organization. So, how do you know if your team members have it? When the going gets tough, look for those who remain composed and can stabilize their emotions and reactions. They will continue to work towards solving the issues and not let downfalls blind them with emotions. Not everyone on your team will have this in high levels, and that's okay. You can help other employees develop compensating behaviors by teaching and practicing different habits and techniques. Emphasize to your employees how important it is for them to stay calm, especially around other employees who may be more emotionally expressive. Showing your employees the long-term benefits of managing their emotions at work will not only benefit your bottom line, but it will also help their careers grow in a healthy manner.

#### 2. Stress tolerance

"A measure of the capacity to remain unworried about possible negative consequences. Those showing high scores may remain unconcerned when faced with events beyond their control. People displaying low scores tend to focus on what might go wrong or potential negative consequences before moving to action." All employees experience stress at some point, especially when things get busy or timelines get tight. During that time, you'll notice that the employees who can maintain a cool, calm, and collected mindset will focus on the task at hand and worry less than their counterparts. Stress can make some individuals single-minded, making negatives seem catastrophic. This can make employees frustrated and disengaged.

Here are some tips to help you develop those who show a lower tolerance for stressful situations:

- 1. Help them find the silver lining when they're overwhelmed and coach them on how to continue this practice for themselves. Once they've discovered the positive, help them create a plan to move forward. Often, stressed employees are just suffering from work paralysis, which can in turn cause more stress.
- 2. Keep an optimistic attitude yourself. Lead by example, and you will be able to better coach your team in maintaining positivity in stressful situations when things get chaotic.
- 3. Look for new opportunities that recurring issues reveal. That might come in the form of gaps in efficiency or the need for improved communication methods. An employee who always struggles at the end of the month due to poor reporting may need technology support or better time management from her team to avoid this in the future.

Coaching and reinforcing these strategies with your employees will help them learn to manage their stress levels when they start to feel overwhelmed. Practicing and maintaining a level of calmness in the face of negative pressures will allow employees to develop endurance towards stress in the future.

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
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If you were to die today, where would you spend eternity? You can know for sure.
