A WORD FROM OUR PRESIDENT

WANT TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE IN THE WORLD?

God can make a difference in our lives by changing our hearts. As God changes our hearts, He begins to work powerfully in our lives. Notice that in both steps, God is the One who does the heavy lifting. He has been making a difference through all of history. He desires to change the world more than you ever will. The good news is that He uses us to make a difference.



God uses His people to bring His will "on earth as it is in heaven" (Matt. 6:10). We're here to tell others about Jesus and to lead the people around us to see the incalculable worth of our God. That task seems huge! How do we do it? It happens as we connect with God and live according to His purpose.

As we move into the world to make a difference, how do we stay connected to this history-shaping, world-changing God? The answer is so simple that it may surprise you: read the Bible. The God who changed our hearts from the old man we were without Christ to the new creation we are in Him, continues to change our hearts through His Word.

God has given His Scriptures to His people so that they can know Him. The Bible is a perfect testimony of who God is and what He's like. It "is inspired by God and is profitable for teaching, for rebuking, for correcting, for training in righteousness" (2 Tim. 3:16). Through His Word God has given us "everything required for life and godliness" (2 Pet. 1:3).

We don't read the Bible as merely a religious exercise. We read the Bible because we believe it will change our lives.

To be difference-makers, first and foremost we have to understand and believe that the power to make a difference isn't found in us; it's found in God. He makes a difference in us as we read His Word and apply it to our lives. Scripture has unique power because it communicates God's thoughts to us. It tells us how we're to relate to Him. Scripture has an authority we don't have. Going to the Bible puts us in contact with God. When we read the Scriptures, the Holy Spirit convicts us of sin, encourages us in our pursuit of the Lord, and changes us from the inside out. If we don't listen to God through His Word, we won't be the kind of people who make a difference. We will simply feel lost, confused, and alone in a very dark world.

There's nothing magical about setting a time and a place to read God's Word, but it's essential to make time for the priorities that are important to us. If we want to know God better, we need to make time to listen to Him through His Word. In our attempts to leave a history-changing, difference-making, life-giving, Spirit-empowered legacy, we must start here. If we don't have the Word of God, we have nothing, and our attempts to make a difference will end in failure because we'll be striving in our own strength instead of being transformed by God's work in our lives. Transformation happens as we read God's Word and commit to doing what it says. We should submit to it. We should believe it. We should memorize it. We should meditate on it. We should come to know it so well that it permeates our hearts and minds.

Together they have driving experience on reefers (refrigerated trailer), dry vans (fully-enclosed trailer), doubles and triples. In addition, they also currently hold tanker, doubles and triples, haz-mat (hazardous material) and Department of Defense clearances.



Currently, they are in the process of selling their home in Illinois. This decision came about after the purchase of a 180" Volvo Super-sleeper (see photos) and the realization that they are staying on the road months at a time. Their truck has all the comforts of home -- shower, toilet, and kitchen with a two-burner stove, microwave/convection oven, large refrigerator, freezer, and sink.

This allows them to really explore our great country on their down times. They tend to grab Ubers and go site-seeing on their thirty-four hour reset, allowing them to build great memories while on the road. Two of their sons are part of the Air Force, stationed in Florida and Arizona. This lifestyle allows them to see their kids and grandkids often without having to pay for airfare.

WHAT IS TRUCKERSFINALMILE?

TFC Global has a licensed and credentials chaplaincy program that we provide to trucking companies and trucking-related organizations. Recently we have also started a casualty and loss program that we can now offer our companies as part of our chaplaincy program through our new affiliate, Truckersfinalmile. Truckersfinalmile is a leading charity serving the trucking industry throughout North America. They have a distinct mission to reunite North American truck drivers and their families in times of crisis. There are several programs that are part of this organization from transporting a driver's remains home, transportation for a severely injured driver to his home for rehabilitation, and the provision of home improvements for handicap adaptation like ramps and hallway widening for permanent disabling injury. The charity also runs a Sleigh Bells & Santa campaign to make sure that children of truck drivers that have passed away on the road are able to receive Christmas presents the first year without their parent(s).

To fund this program, founder Robert Palm has wrapped his truck called the American Heritage Memorial with a road of bricks and is selling them to families who have lost a driver. Each brick can be customized with the driver's name and other information such as military branch and rank, CB handle, nickname, etc. Sales for these bricks go directly to funding the overwhelming need for truckersfinalmile's services. MINISTRY SPOTLIGHT



Adriaan and Marina Fourie have been full-time missionaries in South Africa for over 27 years. Growing up on a farm gave Adriaan a first-hand view of the struggles of this type of career. After graduating from school in 1981, he became a police officer and worked in that field for 15 years. Marina and Adriaan met and were married in 1992. Marina's childhood was great preparation for the mission field by moving frequently to escape the violence and volatility of war. Her family finally settled in South Africa. The couple received a mission call in 1996 and started working to facilitate and execute many short-term trips to Mozambique. They received training through the World Mission Centre and World Outreach for about 3 years in 1998. Many sustainable mission projects have been started and supported by the Fouries. Those projects cover a variety of holistic care for the people of South Africa. They include serving in Zambia, Tanzania and Kenya, addressing poverty in South Africa, working with the Chinese community in a northern province, putting on a weekly food kitchen for

Zimbabwean street children, supporting senior adults in South Africa, caring for immigrants in the local rubbish dump, and most recently, scheduling short-term trips to minister to truck drivers on the border between South Africa and Zimbabwe.

Their ministry to drivers came about after a request to help the heavy vehicle transport industry. Adriaan and Marina found out the many challenges facing this group of people as well as the limited attention being given to them. Xenophobic attacks (country/ethnic prejudice), jacking and looting, prostitution, disease, family dysfunction, long (14-hour) work days, and inexperienced drivers make up some of the challenges facing this community. After seeking the guidance of God and God-fearing mentors, they started the Southern Africa Truckers Ministry. The ministry has a board of directors and seeks to establish an independent network of ministries that can support these drivers and their families.

Southern Africa Truckers Ministry, through Adriaan and Marina Fourie, is sharing their need with many transport companies and churches and wants everyone to pray for the following:

- that they would lean into the Holy Spirit as their Guide
- that they would receive favor when they speak with companies, management, potential field workers and churches
- that the people they speak with would obey the calling of God or the understanding of the need in support
 of this ministry
- that field workers would be able to find the time to do this important work
- that drivers would be transformed by the gospel of Jesus Christ
- that fuel companies would discount or sponsor the cost of fuel for ministry travel

Until All Are Free Workshop: A community action plan to combat and end sex trafficking

Over the past two decades the issue of sex trafficking has been brought increasingly into the light. In 2000, when the "Trafficking Victims Protection Act" (TVPA) was first passed, there were only a handful of organizations combatting sex trafficking in the United States. Today there are over 2,500, with new anti-sex trafficking organizations being formed every year. This has brought about a lot of positive outcomes including: victim identification and rescue, increase in aftercare services, victim prevention education, as well as stronger criminal justice efforts to arrest and prosecute traffickers.

Despite this greater awareness and activity, the crime of sex trafficking continues to increase in the United States and around the world. But why? Why have increased efforts to fight sex trafficking not resulted in diminishing the problem? More importantly what can local communities do to turn the tide in their area, and see a better return on their investment of time and resources?

The Until All Are Free Workshop offers a viable way forward for local communities to effectively combat and end sex trafficking.

At the Gateway to Freedom Foundation we educate local communities on how to effectively combat and end sex trafficking in their community. The good news is that it does not involve working harder, or spending large sums of money, but working smarter. Through the Until All Are Free Workshop a multi-sector approach is offered that targets the root cause of sex trafficking. The premise is that no one person or organization can do everything, but everyone can do something. The workshop helps people and organizations identify what that something is. As a result, participants leave the workshop with a greater sense of hope and purpose in the fight against sex trafficking.



Meet Mark Moad

Truck drivers are some of the most generous people I have met. It would be a benefit to everyone to spend some time with a truck driver and see the human side of the person who chooses the thrill, frustration, and responsibility of driving those 80,000-pound rigs. Too many see trucks as one more obstacle to work around in their busy life.

This year at MATS in Louisville, I spent a few days with some new friends who drive big rigs. One of these men is Robert Palm who leads Truckersfinalmile, our new ministry partner. Robert, Taylor Barker with his band, Travis Pope Sr. and others showed how caring and generous truck drivers are. Underneath the rugged exterior with worn-in boots, fabulous beards, and calloused hands are hearts of gold. It wasn't a surprise to observe an unspoken, yet tightly-held brotherhood. Taylor gave a specific example of seeing Robert Palm giving of his own money, when the money donated to Truckersfinalmile was used up. You could see on their faces the level of respect and honor they have for each other. The phrase, "if you ever need anything, let me know" was common; you know they meant it. You could see it in how they treated people.

One more example of a generous driver who made a lifelong impact needs to be told. My friend Mark Moad, from Hornerstown, PA, told me about one of the first and most significant times he felt the love of Jesus. In 1972, Mark, who was 15 at the time, was kicked out of his house. He had an abusive father, and his mother pushed him out to protect him from his father. Mark found himself sitting in a culvert on the side of a dark country road at 2:00 am. Mark was sitting there all alone and freshly processing the hurt of being kicked out of his house, not knowing what to do. Enter Larry Shumbach, a truck driver returning home after being out on the road. Larry proudly drove his cabover across the country.

The unmistakable sound of semi-truck brakes squealing, hollering, and hopping as smoke rolled off the tires broke the sound of silence that night somewhere in the countryside in Beaver Springs, PA. Larry slammed on his brakes after he saw this young man sitting there. After a few attempts at figuring out the situation, Larry called out, "What are you doing out here?". "Leave me alone," Mark responded. "You hungry?" Larry yelled over the sound of the diesel motor. "Yes," Mark yelled back. "Well, come on. Get in," Larry replied. Mark reluctantly got in the cab. About 200 yards down the road Larry pulled the rig onto his property, parked the truck, and took Mark to the house. Larry woke his wife and said "We have a guest." Just after 2 am, Jean, Larry's wife cooked a breakfast fit for a king, eggs, pancakes and every kind of breakfast meat known to man. Mark ate like it was Thanksgiving.

"You got a place to stay?" Larry asked. "No," responded Mark. "Well, why don't you try out that couch tonight?" Larry offered. Jean got some bedding and put it on the couch. Mark slept there not just that night but kept coming back to the people who reached out to him for the first time with the love of God. Mark said, "They were so kind, warm, and safe." He hadn't felt that in years. Larry and Jean Shumbach acted like his adoptive parents. That night started a relationship that has lasted over 51 years. Larry could have driven right by Mark and gone up to bed. But, because he stopped, Mark felt the love of God through this Christian couple. Mark eventually was so overcome with the love of Jesus that he prayed to confess his sin and receive God's gift of salvation. Today Mark is mostly retired from the HVAC world and is one of the most Godly and generous men I have ever met. 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
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TruckStruck

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DIGITAL COCAINE - PART I

One comment I often receive regarding the cover of my book, Digital Cocaine, is, "That's

confronting." What I think they really mean is something akin to, "That's harsh, and in your face, please try to communicate your message positively."

I'm all for being positive, but then there's this pesky little thing called "the truth." We love it and feel positive when we're already in alignment with the truth. When we're out of alignment with the truth and then are confronted with it, it tends to offend and make us angry. The irony is that the very thing that makes us furious is the only thing that will free us.

"And you shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." John 8:21

We should think twice when tempted to become an enemy of truth. The truth is that brain scans of digital addicts are the same as a cocaine or heroin addict, as illustrated on the cover of Digital Cocaine by a thirteen-year-old boy snorting zeros and ones from his smartphone. Of course, no parent wants to consider their child a drug addict—I get that. But then, there's the truth. Sadly, I suspect most parents who hear me speak and see the brain scans I show think to themselves, "Thank God my child is not that bad," when they probably are.

As a minister of the gospel, I am commissioned by God to tell the truth in love. I care deeply about those who come to hear me speak. However, I've had to ask God to help me love those who push back against the message He has given me, and He has. Even though I go to great lengths to express my sincere love and care, a few people still become angry with me. So, why do I press on? Well, because God loves those addicted to digital drugs. We must reach digital addicts with the good news just like those we reach out to who are addicted to traditional drugs such as alcohol, meth, marijuana, and heroin.

After my sermons and seminars, it is common for people to say, "I had no idea it was that bad." That is how satan (I refuse to honor him by capitalizing his rotten name.) operates; he blinds us to our folly. We compare ourselves to other people and think, "Well, thank God I'm not like those drug addicts on the street."

If you're seasoned in the Word of God, two passages have probably crossed your mind:

"The Pharisee stood by himself and prayed: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other people.'" Luke 18:11

"We do not dare to classify or compare ourselves with some who commend themselves. When they measure themselves by themselves and compare themselves with themselves, they are not wise." 2 Corinthians 10:12

Lying to ourselves by saying we're not like others only perpetuates our problems. Comparing ourselves to others can give us the false impression that we're better off than them—when we're not. Only when we humble ourselves and admit we're all in the same boat of sinful humanity can we receive God's help. For example, although you might resist what you're reading, deep inside, you might wonder if you and your children have an issue with digital addiction. If that's you, don't ignore that inner voice; it might just be the Holy Spirit. God is not angry when we're honest. Never. He only gets testy with us when we ignore Him and lie to ourselves about our condition.

You might be thinking (and I hope you are), "How can I tell if my child is addicted to their technology? I can't afford a brain scan." Now we're getting somewhere with God.
