A WORD FROM OUR PRESIDENT

IS GOD IN THE DRIVER'S SEAT?

I want to start this article by asking "Is God in the driver's seat of your life?" Sadly to say for most people, He is little more than a "Copilot" on our highway of life.

Merriam-Webster defines copilot as "a qualified pilot who assists or relieves the pilot but is not in command."



Psalm 46:10 says, "Cease striving and know that I am God," I don't know about you, but I have never had any success trying to boss someone around while attempting to trust them simultaneously. Trying to be in control and relinquishing control at the same time just doesn't work; they can't co-exist inside the same heart. When we let God drive our lives and trust that He knows best, we are able to rest and stop striving, which means that we will ultimately experience peace.

In the original Hebrew language the phrase "cease striving," indicates giving up by letting our hands down. Interesting, huh? In his book, *Reflections for Ragamuffins*, Brennan Manning writes, "You will trust God only as much as you love Him." You will also only love God as much as you trust Him. As you drive along your journey in life, you'll find that confidence in God's love is always coupled with trust. As I said, this means letting Him drive. When love and trust are combined, they are like a match to faith. They will set your confidence on fire so that you can ride anywhere that God is taking you without fear.

Are you convinced that allowing God to drive is best? If so, I challenge you to let God take the wheel. Granted, this can be hard, especially when life is tough and you're not sure where the road may lead. However, moment by moment, if you choose to trust Him, if you let go, you'll find peace, rest, contentment, communication, and love filling you up. The country is intensifying in passing laws that would prevent Bibles and Christian material to enter some of the states within their country. This will make it harder to ship any containers or distribute the Word of God to these precious people that desperately need to hear and receive it. Stay tuned for details of a partnership between Mission Cry and TFC Global and how you can fund the cost of that container being shipped to Malawi and Tanzania.



THE MISSION CRY STORY

For nearly 70 years Mission Cry has been sending the Word of God and Christian books around the globe. Mission Cry with your help has sent nearly \$500 million worth of donated Bibles and Christian books to over 179 nations around the world. We've encouraged people to send us their extra Bibles and Christian books that are sitting on their shelves, in libraries, universities, or churches. The mission then takes those Bibles and Christian books through a sorting process which are then boxed, palletized, and loaded onto a sea container to be sent around the world. Our recipients and Mission Cry missionaries on the ground can release the container and distribute these materials. Together, we are equipping orphanages, evangelists, missionaries, pastors, church members, and setting up lending libraries and Bible schools abroad. To send a sea container it costs the ministry approximately \$11,000, however, within the container there is nearly \$500,000.00 worth of donated Bibles, Christian authored books, Christian education, and seminary

ABBOTTABAD: Mission Cry is the only known organization to have ministered on the grounds where Osama bin Laden had his camp. We set foot on the compound and declared that land for the work of ministry, gave over 2,000 Bibles to the 500 closest homes surounding the compound. Additionally, we have discipled the new believers in that area, and many have been saved.

BELIZE: In the country of Belize we distributed a Bible or Christian book for every home in the entire country. We held a televised crusade throughout the entire country and ministered to the ambassador of Belize and their military special forces.

CHINA: We continue to send the Word of God to China even with the new restrictions. We can't share many details of the work in this country.

MEXICO: Mission Cry missionaries are distributing the Mission Cry Bible in Spanish and English on the border to Mexicans, Haitians, Ukrainians, Russians, and many more.

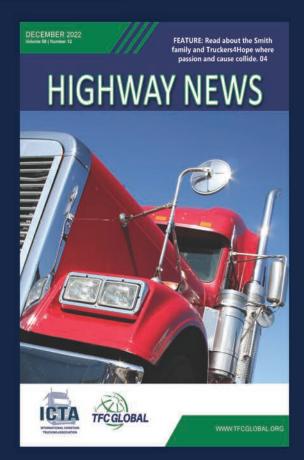

HELP SPREAD THE WORD

This past August 27-31 was the latest CTI (Chaplains Training Institute). It was a fun thing to see all the new chaplains God is bringing to TFC Global.

Since May, 2022, there have been 24 people trained through our CTI (Chaplains Training Institute). This represents those who have come on board with TFC Global and those who have taken the training as ongoing education or to see if God is calling them to chaplaincy. There are always more candidates at various places in our onboarding process. This keeps me very busy and is very cool to see. The quality of chaplains coming on board with TFC Global is top-notch, and they are fun to get to know.

In life it's usually not how much you know but who you know. We need help from people like you who know people in trucking companies who you think would be open to TFC Global chaplaincy services. Philosophically we know it is better to have chaplains ready to minister in a trucking company vs trucking companies waiting for a chaplain.

This is the situation we are in. It is a good problem to have, but man, we sure need places for these guys to serve. Spiritual darkness doesn't even try to hide or disguise itself anymore and eternity in heaven or hell hangs in the balance based on a decision to accept or reject Jesus as Savior. We have chosen a model of chaplaincy that goes to where the people are on a more consistent basis and trucking companies are those primary places.

This is where you come in. We need you to reach out to people you know who drive truck and work for a trucking company. Our main target is anywhere there is a fleet of professional drivers. These new TFC Global chaplains and the office staff are working diligently to contact trucking companies and get in front of the decision-makers of the company. Unfortunately, it usually takes a tragedy before action is taken to get a chaplain in place to be with the company employees, provide Biblical counsel, and follow through weeks after the tragedy occurred. We want to have chaplains in place before the inevitable traumatic even happens. But we can't do this alone. Therefore, I ask you to make contacts and connect us with trucking companies and send them our way. Let's get these guys serving full-time as chaplains.

I look forward to being able to send more reports and updates of TFC Global chaplains serving in trucking companies around the country because of the collective dependency on God and effort by you to help get chaplains where they are needed.

TruckStruck By Lynn Bolster

DISPATCH, INCHES & FREIGHT LANES

It's no secret, the biggest adversary of the trucker is dispatch. They aren't out there, some have never been out there, and, as the saying goes, if you don't go, you don't know. Many, not all, dispatchers come from a place of ease, albeit hectic ease, and sometimes frantic ease. Ease being they go home each night to a warm bed, their own lives and families as compared to the driver who will be sleeping in a parking lot, rest area, or loading dock somewhere probably alone. The hectic and frantic part is when dispatchers are trying unsuccessfully to cover a load. The most common reason they can't cover a load is usually they negotiated a rate too low just to get the customer's business. Often greed can play a part when the brokers take too big a cut of the rate for their services. Skimming this money off the top decreases the driver's pay so who wants to take their cheap freight? They might have their 'pet' drivers who get all the gravy hauls so they won't give any 'bad' loads to them. Sometimes they will say "it's only a couple inches on the map, it's not far." Maps are old school now so it's hard to use that excuse with GPS. But if an inch represents on average 20 miles, several inches add up. And we know everything is either time or money. Dispatch can forget all this as they scramble to cover their promises. All these factors have to fall just so and when calculations are complete they better equal a decent paycheck for the driver who is the one doing the toughest part of the job.

I remember the first time I overheard drivers talking at a truck stop. I knew nothing about the industry as I enjoyed my cherry pie and coffee. One guy was on the way to Nebraska, the other was headed to New Orleans. And in that moment, I thought, trucking makes the country so small. The average person schedules, plans and packs for multiple days before driving to either of these destinations and it's a big deal. And truckers? They just say yes or no and go. It's nothing to them. That's the spontaneity I love about trucking. Are you too hot? Let's load to a cooler climate. Are you too cold? Let's load to a warmer one. This is all great unless you are under forced dispatch and then you go where they send you, no negotiating.

The freight lanes we ran took us south. Why? Fantastic southern cooking, lower fuel prices, friendly people, warmer climate, few if any tolls, and it was all downhill! I once heard a new driver ask the restaurant manager at the Baltimore truck stop how to get to Florida. She looked at him dumbfounded and said, "make a left onto I-95 and don't get off for 800 miles." Couldn't be any simpler!

How many drivers have followed GPS or a map and ended up facing or stuck under a low bridge? Drivers that get stuck rarely live it down. Once we loaded a boat on a boat trailer onto our drop deck. We were looking for a marina at about 3am but took a wrong turn. It was simple to get into the development we were lost in but exiting was exasperating. As we eased along, we spied a low overpass ahead. Now this? With a little calculating in the pitch black of night we realized if it were just the tractor we could slide under. But with the boat's height, we were sunk! We pulled up to the bridge and got out to assess our options. We climbed, measured and waved our flashlights in the night air hoping there was something we missed. Bill looked at the tires on the boat trailer and eureka! He reached over the wheel well and began to let the air out of each tire. We only needed about 5 inches clearance. I slowly inched the truck forward as he stood watch up top. Now you could have barely slid a quarter between the top of the boat and that bridge but we achieved clearance. Or as Rev. Robert Schuller of the old Hour of Power Ministries used to say "inch by inch anything's a cinch!" Amen to that!

It can be a delicate dance between driver and dispatch. Drivers need dispatch to earn a living and dispatch needs drivers to make it happen but finding middle ground can sometimes become a battleground. They want to know where you are every moment or better yet:

You may know where you are, God may know where you are but If dispatch doesn't know where you are You and God better be on good terms!

Over the past few weeks we have been looking at the power of belief.

Why would God focus on our hearts? Wouldn't it be a lot easier to judge people based on what they do or don't do? In Mark 7, Jesus went as far to say that a whole list of evil things come from within.

We would love to believe that God sees us for what we want him to see. We would love for Him to see the way we help people, the way we serve, or even that we went to church. It scares us to hear that God also sees our hidden motives, our inner longings and even our secret sins.

Yet, our hearts, though many times full of pain and wickedness, are also the place where the greatest passions and strengths are found.

As we wade through the darkness within, Jesus wants to be with us. He bought and paid for who we really are. In our hearts. Not who we may try to be.

The gospel is God's answer to every part of the darkness that controls us. Only Jesus can set us free to live the life that we were created to live.

When we are right with God, we are no longer held back.

Then, what is under our hood will have the power to pull regardless of what we may look like on the outside.

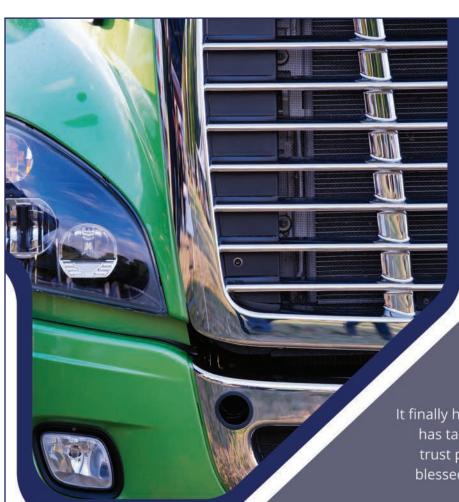

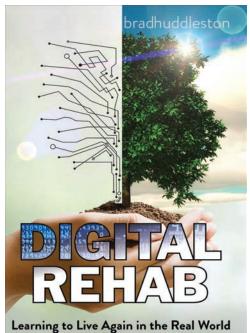

Please do not let what I am about to say overwhelm you. Remember, whenever we decide to do the right thing, God will make a way where there is no way (God's Word is full of true stories of God performing miracles for His children.).

It takes four to six weeks to restore proper dopamine levels (homeostasis) with no technology whatsoever, including not watching television.

I get it. I really do. But I also get crashing. I have a four-year degree in computer science, so I know all too well about overdoing it with screens and then suffering severe burnout. I am advocating seeking the face of God for His wisdom to plan far ahead for a family detox. If your family is in real trouble with misusing or overusing technology, you can either trust God and do something now or wait for a crash where you are forced to do so. I crashed,

and it was hard. I had no choice but to step away and rest. Either way, God will love you and guide you.

God has already given you permission (actually, it's a command) to take care of your body, and if you have children, you are responsible for their well-being. "Do you not know that your bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit, who is in you, whom you have received from God? You are not your own; you were bought at a price. Therefore honor God with your bodies." 1 Corinthians 6:19-20 (NIV) Can you see this is not a beat-up? This is a free-up! God is a good Father who wants you and your family to be well.

Planning is key. Consider taking advantage of a holiday and go tech-free. You might have to speak to your boss and explain that you are not emotionally well and need extra time off. Whatever you have to do, you can trust that God will be with you.

If your good Heavenly Father can make the lame to leap like a deer, a mute to shout for joy, water gush forth in the wilderness, and make streams in the desert (Isaiah 35:6), don't you think He can work on your behalf to do whatever it takes to help you ensure that your family is well?

The critical issue here is not just brain health. In reality, it's spiritual health. So be very honest for just a moment. What do your children talk about all the time? What do they crave? Is it Marvel/DC movies, video games, social media, or the Word of God? Are they passionate about church or show boredom regarding spiritual activities?

A digital detox will do wonders to reorient each family member's spiritual compass. We call it spiritual renewal, revival, and awakening. So, what do you do during the four to six-week detox? Replace, replace, replace. All of that time must be filled with analog (non-digital) activities. Here, the sky is the limit. Whatever you enjoy doing that is not sinful, do it—a lot.

At the top of your analog list should be reading Christian books (printed on paper), sleeping, and exercising. As for me, I love to hunt, fish and exercise. You do whatever tickles your funny bone.

My Digital Rehab book and seminars go into great detail on preparing for a digital fast and cover many complications associated with such a challenging but doable endeavor. However, if you only do what is suggested in this article, God will honor you and change your life and the lives within your family.

I believe God wants to bring a global revival, and it begins with each family returning to Him with undivided hearts.

How do we go about ending the demand? This is where the rubber meets the road.

The how question is one we take seriously at the Gateway to Freedom Foundation. It is the question that drives the work we do including the programs and resources we develop. As a result we have gained some valuable insight about what it takes to reduce and end the demand for consumer sex. Here are just a few things we have learned.

The first and most important is that ending the demand is possible. The work we do is not in vain. There are solutions to reducing and ending the demand. We are seeing people break free from consumer sexual beliefs and behaviors and walk in freedom. This success is important as it encourages us to keep going and to grow and develop more solutions.

Secondly, we have learned that people want to get free. There are many people who feel trapped in consumer sexual behavior and have experienced many negative outcomes because of it. Far from being put off by intervention opportunities, many users are searching for solutions and willing to make personal sacrifices to get free. This provides a call to action for us to reach as many people as possible with awareness, and letting people know that if they want to get free, GTFF can help.

Third, people who are trapped in the behavior need to be offered hope, not judgment. It doesn't work trying to shame people into getting free or to judge them for their behavior. We find that by helping people identify the pain their behavior is causing them and then to offer them tangible solutions is the best approach.

Finally, there is no "one size fits all" tool, program, or resource. That is why we offer a variety of tools and resources for people, knowing that different things work for different people. THE VOICE OF AN EXPERT

The Good Old Days

Today's professional drivers are much different than the guys I knew when I started working in the trucking industry. Yes, I wrote, "guys," as I didn't know any female drivers in the seventies. There were a few women out there, but the steel fabricating plant where I worked used flatbed trailers to haul in the raw steel and the steel products out. Not a lot of women were pulling flatbeds in those days.

Before deregulation, every common carrier load cost the same regardless of the name on the side of the truck because the rates were determined by tariffs. That meant the trucking company had to provide the best service in the area they were allowed to run based on their Interstate Commerce Commission authority. Competition was truly different then.

Without the technology we enjoy today, a typical dispatcher's office included a United States map with the highways marked by brightly colored pins where shippers were located. Loads were recorded on an index card taped to the wall and assigned by pickup date and driver.

The safety department, if it wasn't the dispatcher's job, involved files full of driver qualification folders, drug testing results, and logbooks from the past seven days. Most interactions were negative, as missed logs or violations were often the topic instead of praises for a job well done.

Drivers were also less regulated, although the hours of service were in place, the method of recording was in a paper logbook. It was common for drivers to use two or three logbooks, as enforcement didn't have the technology to match the days and times to tolls, scales, or even carrier records. Shutting down within three hours of home was not an option!

Truck stops had designated areas for professional drivers to get them served and on their way faster. Except, of course, the drivers who were waiting to use one of the many pay phones along a back wall to check in with the dispatcher to get their next load. You were lucky to find a booth with a payphone included so you could eat and wait at the same time.

Before the Commercial Driver's License (CDL) was mandated in 1986, many drivers had numerous chauffer's licenses from various states. That way, if a speeding ticket was received in Ohio, the other states didn't have access to the information. Of course, drivers were expected to report violations annually to their carrier, but it was more of an honor system at the time.

To obtain a chauffer's license, someone might take a written test in one state, or they may have used a pickup truck for a driving test in another state. There wasn't a minimum standard for training and more than one driver has told me they learned to shift and to back the trailer AFTER they were hired.

Many drivers entered the industry because their dad or grandpa was a truck driver. In the past, drivers were considered the knights of the road and a stranded four-wheeler welcomed a tractor trailer slowing down to help them change a flat tire or give them a ride to the next truck stop for a few gallons of gas. Every trucker kept a toolbox in his side compartment and could rig a tractor or trailer with a roll duct tape and a few lengths of binder twine.

The ideal driver was a farm kid, as they learned how to drive heavy equipment at an early age and usually had a better work ethic. Carriers loved those hardworking farm boys! They didn't require much training other than the paperwork, and they were used to long days and hard work.

The early trucks didn't have the amenities we enjoy today. The steering wheel was huge to allow the driver leverage to turn the steers without power steering. Air conditioning wasn't standard and safety features were not common. Double clutching and thirteen speed transmissions took some time to master.

The trucking industry has changed since I started my career in the traffic department of a steel fabricating plant. I had a diploma in Traffic & Transportation Management on my wall amid the maps, the shelves full of tariffs, and the index cards. Deregulation changed the industry into a MORE regulated one as technology has been mandated through the years.

More technology means more monitoring and less autonomy, which is what attracted most drivers to the career in the past. Ask any seasoned driver about the "good old days," and they'll tell you how things have changed. These drivers are leaving the industry to a new generation that will never appreciate how things have changed so quickly.

Will new drivers look back in a few decades and consider these, "the good old days?"
