A WORD FROM OUR PRESIDENT

THE GRACE OF GOD

Matthew 11 28-30 says, "Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light."

What does this mean? It means to walk with Jesus, work with Him, and learn from Him. It refers to living freely and abundantly, without being burdened by heavy or ill-fitting expectations. It is about keeping company with Jesus and learning to live out of His abundance. It is in contrast to the struggle and strain found in self-effort.



"Are you tired? Worn out? Burned out on religion? Jesus is saying come to me. Get away with me, and you'll recover your life. I'll show you how to take a real rest. Walk with me and work with me, watch how I do it. Learn about God's grace and what that means for you. He said "I won't lay anything heavy or ill-fitting on you. Keep company with me and you'll learn to live freely and lightly."

Do you feel as though you are trapped on a never-ending treadmill based on your own efforts to try to earn God's forgiveness, God's approval, and God's acceptance? That is based on "legalistic religion not relationship."

If you are trying to earn your own forgiveness and thinking that God is constantly mad at you, I am here to tell you that is not the heart of God. When Jesus spoke of these words He was referring to the fact that there is an ease and enjoyment when you walk in His grace. This is in contrast to the struggle and strain found in self-effort. There is such rest when you know there is nothing you can do to earn His forgiveness.

Give up on your own self-righteousness, which the Bible describes as "filthy rags" (Isa. 64:6), and with open arms and an open heart, receive His forgiveness!

The key to getting out of a cycle of sin and defeat is to receive Him and to stop beating yourself up. Receive Him and stop punishing yourself because your sins have already been punished on the body of another. His name is Jesus, our beautiful Lord and Savior. No wonder the gospel is called the "good news".

When you understand God's grace and forgiveness, you will understand the difference between obligation and relationship. Under the old covenant of the law, right living is done out of religious obligation. Under the new covenant of grace, everything we do today is birthed out of an inward motivation that flows directly from a love relationship with Jesus.

God is not a legalist. He doesn't want you to read His Word just because He said so, as a religious obligation. He wants you to experience His love and spend time in His Word because you want to enjoy His sweet presence.

You can read His Word out of legalism and to try to earn God's forgiveness and acceptance, or you can do it out of relationship because you know you have been forgiven. The reality is, when you don't read the Bible, you should not be feeling guilty; you should be feeling hungry.

Jesus invites you to keep company with Him, and you'll learn to live freely and abundantly because you have come to understand the true meaning of God's grace, having experienced it in your own life.

In a recent unexpected death, the trucking community lost a kind and wonderful member in Jim Germak. Jim always wanted to be a truck driver. He started his trucking career at 18 years old. By the time he was 23, Jim had purchased an F-model Mack and flatbed trailer. He worked as an owner operator hauling building products and steel.

In 1976, he married his wife Linda, and in 1982, they started their new business -- JAGTRUX, INC., a contract/common carrier. From its small beginnings, Jagtrux, Inc. has grown into a successful 75-acre enterprise, including a maintenance shop, offices, cross dock facilities, and secure trailer storage lots.

Jagtrux has always thrived on solving the customer's unique needs through innovative means. They were the first carrier to introduce the curtain-sided van concept on the east coast, as well as the first truck to test load it out of the Armstrong World Industries facility in Marietta, Pennsylvania. They also became one of the first carriers to use 102 inch wide vans and to require all trucks, owned and leased, to carry a pallet jack at all times to assist customers in the unloading process.

Jagtrux, Inc. believes that the core component of our business is relationships. They have a dedicated group of employees and permanently leased independent contractors that contribute to their daily successes. They also have a network of strong business relationships. Building strong relationships allows them to deliver the best results for their customers. Relationships have enabled Jagtrux to become an elite carrier throughout Pennsylvania and the northeast for nearly 40 years.

Jim is also the founding partner of the Marietta auction company called Hess Auctioneers. His community involvement also includes being a board member for the PMTA (Pennsylvania Motor Truck Association).

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GOING THE EXTRA MILE

If you had to pick one profession that has the best chance to end sex trafficking, what profession would you pick? Would it be law enforcement? Criminal law? Federal and state governments? Those are logical choices and they certainly have an important role to play in combatting sex trafficking. However, I would argue that trucking has just as an important role to play, and even greater potential to end sex trafficking than either of the other three.

It is a well known fact among pimps and traffickers around the world that the trucking profession provides a sizable, profitable and reliable customer base. Pimps are known to specifically target truck stops, rest areas and other trucking locations as a good place to do business. Although I am not aware of exact estimates, it is safe to say, based on the pimps behavior, that the professional driver is a key demographic of the buyer demand, quite possibly to the point where pimps and traffickers rely on their money.

So, what would happen to the business of sex trafficking, if the driver stopped paying for sex? It would be catastrophic. Just imagine how any industry would survive if they lost one of their largest consumer bases. For example, imagine if teen boys and young adult men (18-34 yrs old), which make up the largest consumer base of energy drinks, stopped buying energy drinks. Would it create a crisis within the industry? Absolutely! Many companies would go out of business and the rest would be forced to drastically reduce their operations. A similar fate would befall sex traffickers, if the professional driver stopped paying for sex. Many traffickers would go out of business and the others would be forced to reduce their operations. Ultimately that would lead to a drastic reduction of victims being exploited.

This is why TFC Global created the Gateway to Freedom Foundation with a focus of educating the professional driver and company about demand reduction. As it turns out many trucking companies are educating their drivers about how to identify human trafficking and what to do if they see it, but they are not educating them about the harms of consumer sex and how it fuels sex trafficking. Trucking companies can go the extra mile in the fight against sex trafficking by partnering with the Gateway to Freedom Foundation to educate their drivers about consumer sex, and providing resources to help them get free. 

Then the bottom fell out. We have all had days like this.

There were delays in unloading. "Mr. Weaver, there are issues with your paperwork." There were delays at my first pick up. "Mr Weaver, your stuff isn't quite ready yet. Go sit in your truck and we will call you." There were delays at the next pick up. "Mr Weaver, your stuff is ready, but there are trucks ahead of you..."

There were delays at nearly every stop that day.

Since I was in New York City, we all know what happened after that. Traffic delays.

Anyone who has been in trucking for any amount of time has experienced these trials.

I know most of you would have been cool as a cucumber in navigating these challenges.

I too would have been cool... on the outside.

But, I am usually boiling on the inside.

That day something was different. I was different.

We all encounter tests. Moments of challenge that we know are coming; we just don't know how or when they will come. In Numbers 13 we see a test that God gave his people.

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

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INDUSTRIAL GARAGE

Twice in my life I have lived over a garage. As a kid, our garage was under my bedroom. It was a normal, healthy garage with few, if any oil stains on the cement floor, reasonably organized and no remaining fumes or odors. That is unless you counted the smell of skunk cabbage that used to grow in the swamp behind our house near the garage. It was the kind of garage where you could set up a folding table and chairs on a hot day, sit inside with the door up, keeping cool while passing the potato salad, hot dogs and lemonade around. It was actually just another room in the house.

Once trucking was in my life, a garage took on a whole new role. It was part of the house, still under the bedroom but house garage it was not, industrial garage became its name. A twelve-foot door to accommodate big trucks, grease and oil stains galore, mice, mold, a massive number of tools, compressors, welding equipment, water seeping in, septic close by...not particularly healthy but a productive garage. No potato salad here unless you were eating it while simultaneously holding, with greasy hands, a bologna sandwich with a side of diesel soot to go.

Backing old Kenworth into the garage was not a problem, the issue was when it was time to drive her out. Since air pressure has to build for several minutes before you can move a truck, guess what belched out the stacks while waiting? Yep, diesel smoke and where did it go – upstairs into the house. I used to see the soot stains on my Tupperware in the kitchen. Have you ever tried to stop smoke? How about stopping the smell? Now I have to admit I love me some diesel smell. (I think it goes back to my childhood. We used to go to the dentist in the city and had to wait on the street corner to cross. The buses and trucks would drive by and I remember inhaling their exhaust, enjoying the smell - I guess it does literally get into your system because I don't mind it to this day.) Anyway, I would turn on the big fan near the ceiling, but since it hung ten inches below the stacks, it wasn't pushing much out the door.

The garage door was a huge, outdated, metal beast, all but impossible to open. Once up it was hard to get down and once down it was hard to get up. We finally got an electronic opener but if you pushed the button too long, it would jump off track and take hours to get right again. Bill was not a happy camper during these episodes.

Even though this garage had its challenges, the amount of work done in there was huge. Guys came over to pick Bill's brain about what was wrong with their motors, get tires changed out or have youname-it done to their truck, not to mention us working on our stuff and their stuff at the same time. There were many jobs done that I would label 'just because you can doesn't mean you should.' Some days it was just Bill, me and the guys shooting the breeze with a cold drink, as their cigar smoke floated in the air. Often there was more of this than actual work being done.

Me being the clean-up junk gal that I am, after so much time, couldn't bear all the parts, pieces and what-not-have-yous sitting around leaking and seeping everywhere. Bill would be too tired to clean up and of course couldn't part with anything. So, on many a Sunday, I would park him in a chair, and I would drag dilapidated parts out of the dirt section (yes we had a dirt floor on one side) and ask him: scrap, sell or save? This way I not only got a good workout, as most of the parts being from a semi carried a good bit of weight, but I was able to keep his rag tag bunch of parts in some semblance of organization. He had no problem with my participation, in fact, he would often say "do you remember where I put (fill in the blank)?" I would immediately recite the location and remind him of the expression "do you want to talk to the man in charge or the woman who knows what's going on?"

Having our own garage as truckers was a blessing, as owneroperators it was essential. Just remember, if you decide to paint a truck red, like Bill did - in the garage without a paint booth - don't do it. If I didn't like diesel soot on Tupperware, I really found it hard to like a red mist on it. Have you ever tried to stop paint overspray or paint fumes? Have we not learned anything?

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A CHAPLAIN WHO PRAYS

As a believer, I know there is an assumption I should pray. The reality of prayer being a real part of the ebbs and flow of my everyday life varies, but with concentrated effort, things have improved greatly in me over the last five years. It's an oxymoron to think of a Christian, saved by God, and not be in communication with Him. That can't be how we live our lives.

The 12 disciples asked Jesus, "teach us to pray". This request to their Rabbi was right after they observed Jesus in another extended time of prayer to the Father. Luke 11 and Matthew 6 give us the most details on how this conversation went down. Jesus uses the word "when" three times in Matthew 6:5-7. It is clear based on the words Jesus used that he expects and assumes His followers to pray. The phrase, "when you pray, is followed by, "This then is how you should pray" in verse 9.

Why am I writing on prayer for the month we celebrate Christmas? I want you, as supporters of TFC Global, to know the TFC Global leadership staff and chaplains place a high value on prayer. From the top down, prayer is a value we put into practice. There is prayer at every staff meeting, chaplains meeting, chaplain candidate interview and any in-person meetings. We want there to be no doubt we are fulfilling Jesus' assumption in the phrase, "when you pray".

I have been on staff in three different Christian ministries, and it was all too common to plan, have meetings and take action without prayer. Is God really guiding if someone is asked at the end of a planning meeting to "pray for God to bless our plans"? Imagine what God thinks about that: His children, whom He sent His son to die for, paid the sin debt for, desires to be in a close relationship, and they plan without Him. Then they send up a gratuitous prayer for His blessing when they are done planning. That is foolish thinking. That reality is a lack of faith. It goes against the natural assumption of Jesus for His followers.

I want you to know prayer is a part of TFC Global Chaplaincy Services. We are powerless without it. We can't expect to be and feel close to God without talking to Him. Prayer is before, during and after meetings, chaplain interviews, conversations with trucking company owners, as part of giving counsel to drivers and when the gospel is offered to someone. This prayer focus does not happen by accident. It is intentional. I am grateful to be part of it and contribute to this as the culture of TFC Global.

As we seek entry into more trucking companies and spaces to serve the trucking community, prayer is the beginning, middle and end in this process. With this in mind, please stop for a few minutes right now to pray to God the Father, in Jesus name, for us to see His guidance, discern His will, and go in His power. We need the TFC Global community of faith partners to be in prayer for the sake of people being brought to the light of the gospel.

MAY YOU HAVE A TECH-FREE CHRISTMAS

Have you ever been asked, "What did Santa bring you for Christmas?" For Christians, gift-giving for Christmas has nothing to do with a calorically challenged man wearing a tacky red suit and donning a fake beard. I thought I was hooked up properly but I wasn't. It could have been quite an expensive error. Thankfully I was able to dolly down the trailer, drop the air on the tractor suspension and slide back under the trailer, lesson learned.

OK, let's learn some parts. The fifth wheel is a large steel plate attached to the tractor with a large slot in it. Near the front of the trailer, underneath, is the kingpin – just a piece of round steel about 4" in length and approximately 2" wide extending from the underneath of the trailer. When hooking up, you back the tractor under the trailer so that the kingpin goes into the slot. When it's fully in, a bar locks into place behind the pin and firmly connects the tractor to the trailer. The connection is deceivingly small and invisible to most people, yet it's incredibly strong.

There is a huge spiritual correlation here that we must not ignore. Do you have the invisible connection with Jesus that holds your life together in good times and bad? Are you sure?

Many times, I have asked men I counsel if they have prayed to ask Jesus into their life. They often think a minute and reply they have prayed that prayer – usually many years ago. And that was it. They may still attend church services and even serve in the church, but it's clear that a relationship with Jesus isn't the guiding force in their life. Is the prayer alone the assurance needed to be convinced we are properly connected? Jesus was very clear that we could not only pray a prayer but we can be active in church and still not truly be known by Him.

Jesus related a disturbing story in Matthew 7:21-23, "Not

everyone who calls out to me, 'Lord! Lord!' will enter the Kingdom of Heaven. Only those who actually do the will of my Father in heaven will enter. On judgment day many will say to me, 'Lord! Lord! We prophesied in Your name and cast out demons in Your name and performed many miracles in Your name.' But I will reply, 'I never knew you. Get away from Me, you who break God's laws."

Jesus's invitation isn't to simply pray a prayer inviting Him into our life. His invitation has always been, "Follow Me." A true connection with Jesus should transform us. We not only invite Him into our life but we actually begin to change, becoming more like Him. We allow Him into every part of our life until He becomes the deep center – that place from which all decisions and behaviors flow. Ultimately, we grow into new ways of living. We grow in understanding and obedience to Jesus's teachings - communicating with Him regularly and hanging out with other believers. That's how we grow – That's how we change. The truth is my truck became disconnected because I didn't examine the connection closely enough during my pre-trip inspection. Had I slowed down and looked more closely, I would have seen an improper connection and resolved it. Paul gives us similar directions to make certain that we are true followers of Jesus. He challenges us to, "Examine yourselves to see if your faith is genuine. Test yourselves. Surely you know that Jesus Christ is among you; if not, you have failed the test of genuine faith." (2 Corinthians 13:5)

When our connection to Jesus is secure, though invisible to others, it becomes the strength we need to live life every day. Take time to double check . . . Is Jesus central to your life? It's a life-or-death connection with eternal consequences, so don't take chances. The invitation from Jesus stands to this day: "Follow Me." Responding "Yes" gets you connected. Living into your "yes" will take the rest of your life but trust me when I tell you, the journey will be worth it!

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
